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PREFACE

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This publication describes how to use the initialization diskette and the information on the diskette or a user-designed operating system to load attachment storage for the IBM Series/1 Multi-Function Attachment Feature. The reader should be an experienced Series/1 assembler-language programmer, who writes, maintains, and debugs machine-level-language programs. The reader should also be familiar with binary and hexadecimal numbering systems, and stored-program concepts.

The information is presented in four chapters and two appendixes:

- Chapter 1, "Introduction," introduces the reader to the methods described in this book for configuring attachment-storage loads and initializing the attachment.
- Chapter 2, "Initialization Diskette User Options," describes how to use the initialization diskette by providing step-by-step instructions for each of the diskette options.
- Chapter 3, "How to Modify a Copy of the Default Attachment Storage load," provides information about the attachment storage locations that may be modified by the user.
- Chapter 4, "Loading a User-Designed Operating System," describes methods available for placing attachment storage loads into a user-designed operating system.
- Appendix A, "Loader Program Coding Example," contains a coding example that may be used as a guide for writing an attachment storage load to attachment storage.
- Appendix B, "Halt Codes," contains a list of the halt codes that may occur while using the initialization diskette.

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This book describes how the Multi-Function Attachment Feature may be initialized using the initialization diskette or a user-designed operating system. The customer engineer must tailor the diskette before the procedures in this book can be used.

The following flowchart illustrates the methods described in this book.



INITIALIZATION DISKETTE DESCRIPTION

The initialization diskette is a two-sided diskette that:

- Contains one default attachment storage load in basic exchange format (see Note 1), which may be used to load and initialize the attachment or which may be copied and modified by a user-designed operating system.
- Contains a control program, which allows the user to select options from a menu. The control program must be the only program in control of all Series/1 system resources.

The control program menu provides the options and functions shown in the following chart:

Option	Function
00	Create attachment storage loads
01	Delete attachment storage loads
02	List attachment storage loads
03	Load and initialize the attachment(s)
04	Terminate the control program

 Contains the attachment storage loads (see Note 2) created using option 00.

Notes:

- Basic exchange format has the following characteristics: the data set is organized sequentially, the records are in fixed-length format, the physical record length is 256 bytes, and the data set identifier (field 5 of HDR1) is a name of up to eight characters. For information about the header labels, including HDR1, refer to "Diskette Description and Format" in Chapter 4.
- The attachment storage loads stored on the diskette may also be referred to as datasets. Each data set is associated with a header label. For information about the header labels, including HDR1, refer to "Diskette Description and Format" in Chapter 4.

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Up to 15 sections (or blocks) of information, called attachment storage loads, may be created; howaver, only one attachment storage load may be assigned to each multi-function attachment feature. Each attachment storage load is stored on the initialization diskette when the procedure in Chapter 2, "How to Configure Attachment Storage Loads," is performed.

HARDWARE REQUIREMENTS

The following describes the minimum system hardware configuration required to use the initialization diskette.

- A Series/1 processor
- 16K bytes of processor storage
- A programmer console or alternate console (see Note)
- An IBM 4964 Diskette Unit, 4965 Diskette Unit, 4966 Diskette Magazine Unit, or 4962 Disk Storage Unit Model 2, 2F, or 4

Note: A console is assigned when the customer engineer tailors the initialization diskette.

If an IBM 3101 Display Terminal is used as the alternate console attached to the multi-function attachment card, the set up switches on the 3101 are set as follows:

If the communications indicator panel is connected to the multi-function attachment card, the DISPLAY/FUNCTION SELECT switches must be set in the down position (00000) during attachment initialization.

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CHAPTER 2. INITIALIZATION DISKETTE OPTIONS

The initialization diskette provides the following options:

- Option 00—Configures attachment storage loads.
- Option 01—Deletes attachment storage loads.
- Option 02-Lists attachment storage loads.
- Option 03—Loads and initializes the attachment(s).
- Option 04—Terminates the initialization diskette control program.

HOW TO CONFIGURE ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOADS

This section provides step-by-step instructions for option 00.

- Identify the multi-function attachment's configuration for each attachment card installed. (The user should list the base device address and the devices that are connected to the multi-function attachment card. For each communications device, the user may list the modem options desired before beginning this procedure.)
- Initial program load (IPL) the initialization diskette.

In this procedure, a statement about a message displayed on a display terminal is shown followed by a halt code in parentheses, such as (halt E601). <u>The</u> <u>halt code appears in the indicators if the programmer</u> <u>console is connected</u>.

An option menu is displayed (halt E601).

- 3. When the option menu is displayed (halt E601), select option 00 as follows:
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type F00; then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmers console is assigned, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) 0000 (I) (I)

Note: A (B) means to press the Data Buffer key on the programmer console. Enter 1F on the programmer console keypad. An (I) means to press the Console Interrupt key on the programmer console once. For more information on how to use the programmer console, refer to <u>IBM Series/1 Operator's Guide</u>, GA34-0039.

4. The following is displayed (halt E620).

BASE ADDRESS

- 5. Enter the base device address of the multi-function attachment to be configured in the format Fxx, as follows.
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type FFC (if the base device address is FC); then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmer console is assigned and the base device address is FC, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) FC00 (I) (I)

The following is displayed (halt E622):

- 6. Enter yes to use the default configuration. Enter no to create a custom attachment storage load. Use the following format to respond to the message or halt code:
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type 1 for a yes response or 0 for a no response; then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmer console is assigned enter:
 (B) 1 (I) (I) for a yes response
 (B) 0 (I) (I) for a no response

Note: Use the format previously described to enter yes or no responses to messages or halts shown in this book. (The format is not repeated in this procedure.)

7. Go to step 8 if you answered **no** to the previous question.

If you answered **yes** to the previous question, the default attachment storage load is stored on the diskette. The configuration is complete, and the option menu is displayed (halt E601). Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

8. The following is displayed (halt E623):

DEVICE COUNT 01, 02, 03 or 04

- 9. Enter the device count that matches the number of devices that you want to activate, as follows:
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type F01, F02, F03, or F04 (for a device count of 1, 2, 3, or 4); then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmer console is assigned and the device count is 1, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 - (B) 0100 (I) (I)
- 10. The following is displayed (halt E624):

DEVICE TYPE 1

- Enter the device type for the base device address (associated with port 0) of the multi-function attachment feature, as follows.
 - If a display terminal is assigned as the console: type Fxxxx (see the list of device types); then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmer console is assigned and the device type is xxxx (see the following chart for a list of device types):
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) xxxx (I) (I)

Note: If you are using the programmer console, the device type number 1, 2, 3, or 4 (associated with port 0, 1, 2, or 3) is located in processor register 3 level 3 when the E624 halt occurs. Press the Stop key on the programmer console; then, press the R3 key to display the contents of processor register 3. After you have displayed and recorded the contents of register 3, press the Start key and continue this procedure.

Select the desired device type from the following chart.

Do you want the leased line option selected? Enter **yes** or **no**.

- If you answered yes (leased line) to the previous question, go to step 15. If you answered no, continue.
- 14. The following is displayed (halt E62D):

ANSWERTONE?

Do you want the answertone option selected? Enter yes or no.

15. The following is displayed (halt E628):

DTR?

Do you want the data-terminal-ready (DTR) option. selected? Enter yes or no.

16. The following is displayed (halt E629):

RTS?

Do you want the request-to-send (RTS) option selected? Enter yas or no.

17. The following is displayed (halt E62E):

DISABLE IPL?

Do you want the disable-IPL option selected? Enter yes or no.

18. The following is displayed (halt E62F):

MP TRIB?

Do you want the multipoint-tributary option selected? Enter yes or no.

 If you answered no to the previous question go to step
 If you answered yes to the previous question continue. 20. The following is displayed (halt E630):

SECONDARY STATION ADDRESS 1 IN HEX

Enter the first secondary-station address in hexadecimal form, as follows.

- If a display terminal is assigned as the console and the first secondary-station address is C1, type FC1; then, press the Enter or Return key.
- If the programmer console is assigned, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) C100 (I) (I)

Note: The secondary-station address number 1, 2, 3, or 4 requested by the program is located in processor register 3, level 3 at the time of the E630 halt. Press the Stop key on the programmer console; then, press the R3 key to display the contents of processor register 3. After you have displayed and recorded the contents of processor register 3, press the Start key and continue this procedure. (This process may be used in this and the next three steps.) 21. The following is displayed (halt E630):

SECONDARY STATION ADDRESS 2 IN HEX

Enter the next secondary-station address in hexadecimal form. (Use the same format described in step 20.)

Note: If you do not have another secondary-station address for this and the next two steps, repeat the last secondary-station address used. All four secondary-station addresses must contain a value other than 0.

22. The following is displayed (halt E630):

SECONDARY STATION ADDRESS 3 IN HEX

Enter the next secondary-station address in hexadecimal form. (Use the same format described in step 20.)

23. The following is displayed (halt E630).

SECONDARY STATION ADDRESS 4 IN HEX

Enter the next secondary-station address in hexadecimal form. (Use the same format described in step 20.) 24. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

25. The following is displayed (halt E626) (because you assigned a device type of 2016 to device type 1):

RS232C?

Enter **yes** to select an EIA¹ RS232C interface, or enter **no** if you have an EIA RS422 interface.

26. If you answered yes to the previous question, skip to step 27.

If you answered **no** to the previous question, the device is assigned an EIA RS422 interface. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

27. The following is displayed (halt E627):

MODEM?

Enter **yes** if a modem is used with the connected device or enter **no** if a modem is not used.

28. If you answered yes to the previous question, skip to step 29.

If you answered no to the previous question, continue. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

29. The following is displayed (halt E62C):

LEASED LINE?

Enter **yes** if you have a leased line, or enter **no** if you do not have a leased line.

30. The following is displayed (halt E628):

DTR?

Do you want the data-terminal-ready (DTR) option selected? Enter **yes** or **no**.

31. The following is displayed (halt E629):

RTS?

Do you want the request-to-send (RTS) option selected? Enter yes or no.

32. The following is displayed (halt E62A):

DRS?

Do you want the data-rate-select option selected? Enter yes or no.

(Data-rate select may also be called half-rate select on some modems.)

33. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

34. The following is displayed (halt E626) (because you assigned a device type of 0208 or 020A to device type 1):

RS232C?

Enter **yes** if the device is connected using an EIA RS232C interface, or enter **no** if the device is connected using an EIA RS422 interface.

35. If you answered **yes** to the previous question, skip to step 36.

If you answered **no** to the previous question, continue. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

36. The following is displayed (halt E627):

MODEM?

Enter yes if the device is connected using a modem; enter **no** if the device is connected without a modem.

37. If you answered **yes** to the previous question (MODEM?) skip to step 41.

If you answered **no** to the previous question no modem is used.

If the device type previously selected is a 4975 model 02R (device type 020A) the folowing is displayed (halt E625):

LINE SPEED

Go to step 39 if LINE SPEED is displayed (halt E625); otherwise, go to step 38.

38. A 4975 model 01R (device type 0208) was previously selected. The line speed is set to 1200 bps.

If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

LINE SPEED

The device type previously selected is 020A. Select the entry value for the desired line speed for the 4975 model 02R from the following chart.

40. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

41. The following is displayed (halt E628):

DTR?

Do you want the data-terminal-ready (DTR) option selected? Enter **yes** or **no**.

42. The following is displayed (halt E629):

RTS?

Do you want the request-to-send (RTS) option selected? Enter **yes** or **no**.

43. The following is displayed (halt E62B):

INTERNAL CLOCK?

Do you want the internal clocking option selected? Enter yes or no. 44. If you answered **no** to the previous question, skip to step 47.

If you answered yes to the previous question, continue.

45. If the device type previously selected is 020A, the following is displayed (halt E625):

LINE SPEED

Go to step 46 if line speed (halt E625) is displayed; otherwise, go to step 47.

46. Device type 020A was previously selected. The following is displayed (halt E625):

LINE SPEED

Select the entry value for the desired line speed for the 4975 model 02R from the following chart:

47. If a device count of 1 (selected previously in this procedure) was specified, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

If a device count of more than 1 was specified, the following is displayed (E624); go to step 48.

DEVICE TYPE 2

48. The following is displayed (halt E624):

DEVICE TYPE 2

Enter the device type for the device connected to, or the function associated with, the base device address +1 (port 1).

- If a display terminal is assigned as the console: type Fxxxx (see the following chart for a list of device types); then, press the Enter or Return key.
- If the programmer console is assigned and the device type is xxxx (see the list of device types):
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) xxxx (I) (I)

Note: If you are using the programmer console, the device type number 1, 2, 3, or 4 (associated with ports 0, 1, 2, or 3) is located in processor register 3, level 3, when the E624 halt occurs. Press the Stop key on the programmer console; then, press the R3 key to display the contents of processor register 3. After you have displayed and recorded the contents of register 3, press the Start key and continue this procedure.

Select the desired device type from the following chart:

DEVICE TYPE 3

- If a display terminal is assigned as the console: type Fxxxx (see the following chart for a list of device types); then, press the Enter or Return key.
- If the programmer console is assigned and the device type is xxxx (see the following chart for a list of device types), enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) xxxx (I) (I)

Note: If you are using the programmer console, see the note in step 48 to display the device type number 1, 2, 3, or 4.

Select the desired device type from the following chart:

DEVICE TYPE 4

- If a display terminal is assigned as the console: type Fxxxx (see the following chart for a list of device types); then, press the Enter or Return key.
- If the programmers console is assigned and the device type is xxxx (see the list of device types), enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) xxxx (I) (I)

Note: If you are using the programmer console, see the note in step 48 to display the device type number 1, 2, 3, or 4.

Select the desired device type from the following chart:

51. After the device type for device type 4 is entered, the configuration is complete and the option menu (E601) is displayed. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

HOW TO DELETE ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOADS

This section provides step-by-step instructions for option 01.

1. IPL the initialization diskette.

In this procedure, a statement about the message displayed on a display terminal is shown followed by a halt code, such as E601, in parenthesis. <u>The halt</u> <u>code appears in the indicators if the programmers</u> <u>console is connected</u>.

An option menu is displayed (halt E601):

MFA INITIALIZATION DISKETTE CONTROL PROGRAM MENU 00=CONFIGURE ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD MODULE 01=DELETE ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD MODULE 02=LIST ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD MODULE CONFIGURATIONS 03=LOAD ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD MODULES AND INITIALIZE 04=TERMINATE SELECT ONE OPTION

- When the option menu is displayed (halt E601), select option 01, as follows:
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type F01; then, press the Enter or Return key.
 - If the programmers console is assigned, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) 0100 (I) (I)

Note: A (B) means to press the data buffer key on the programmer console. Press 1F on the programmers console keypad. An (I) means to press the Console Interrupt key on the programmer console once. For more information on how to use the programmers console, refer to <u>IBM Series/1 Operator's</u> <u>Guide</u>, GA34-0039. 3. The following is displayed (halt E640):

ADDRESS TO DELETE

Enter the base device address of the attachment associated with the attachment storage load that you want to delete in the following format Fxx, as follows.

- If a display terminal is assigned: type FFC (if the base device address is FC); then, press the Enter or Return key.
- If the programmers console is assigned and the base device address is FC, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) FC00 (I) (I)
- 4. The following is displayed (E642):

ADDRESS XX DELETED

5. The attachment storage load associated with the attachment address XX is deleted. The option menu (halt E601) is displayed.

HOW TO LIST ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOADS

This section provides step-by-step instructions for option 02.

The user must have previously used option 00 from the initialization diskette control program menu (described earlier in this chapter) to store either the default attachment storage load, or at least one custom attachment storage load on the diskette before performing this procedure.

1. IPL the initialization diskette.

In this procedure, a statement about the message displayed on a display terminal is shown followed by a halt code, such as E601, in parenthesis. <u>The halt</u> <u>code appears in the indicators if the programmer con-</u> <u>sole is connected</u>.

An option menu is displayed (halt E601):

- When the option menu is displayed (halt E601), select option 02 as follows:
 - If a display terminal is assigned: type F02; then, press the Enter or Return key.

Interrupt key on the programmer console once. For more information on how to use the programmer console, refer to <u>IBM Series/1 Operator's Guide</u>,

If the programmers console is assigned, enter:
 (B) 1F (I)
 (B) 0200 (I) (I)

Note: A (B) means to press the Data Buffer key on the programmer console. Press 1F on the programmer console keypad. An (I) means to press the Console

If you are using the programmer console, processor register 3, level 3, contains the processor-storage address of the first word of the message at the time of the E652 halt.

Initialization Diskette Options

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Note: Press the Stop key on the programmer console; then, press the R3 key to display the contents of processor register 3 level 3. After you have displayed and recorded the contents of each processor-storage location in the processorstorage block, press the Start key; then, enter (B) 6 (I) (I) to continue.

HOW TO LOAD AND INITIALIZE THE ATTACHMENT

This section provides step-by-step instructions for option 03.

This chapter describes how to load and initialize attachment storage from the initialization diskette, using a display terminal or the programmer console.

The user must have previously used option 00 on the initialization diskette control program menu (described earlier in this chapter), to store either the default attachment storage load or to create at least one custom attachment storage load, before performing this procedure.

Note: If the communications indicator panel is connected to the attachment card, the DISPLAY/FUNCTION SELECT switches must be placed in the down position (00000) during attachment initialization.

1. IPL the initialization diskette.

In this procedure, a statement about the message displayed on a display terminal is shown followed by a halt code, such as E601, in parenthesis. <u>The halt</u> <u>code appears in the indicators if the programmers</u> <u>console is connected</u>.

An option menu is displayed (halt E601):

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All attachment storage loads are loaded. Select another option or go to "How to Terminate the Initialization Diskette Control Program," described later in this chapter.

HOW TO TERMINATE THE INITIALIZATION DISKETTE CONTROL PROGRAM

This section provides step-by-step instructions for option 04.

An option menu is displayed (halt E601):

- When the option menu is displayed (halt E601), select option 04, as follows:

Note: A (B) means to press the Data Buffer key on the programmer console. Press 1F on the programmer console keypad. An (I) means to press the Console Interrupt key on the programmer console once. For more information on how to use the programmers console, refer to <u>IBM Series/1 Operator's Guide</u>, GA34-0039.

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The user may copy or read the default attachment storage load from the initialization diskette using any of the methods described in this chapter. After the default attachment storage load is available to the user-designed operating system, the user's program may modify individual attachment storage locations.

The default attachment stotage load contains 3,840 (decimal) bytes of data which must be loaded into attachment storage addresses 4080 through 4F7F (hexadecimal).

The checksum word must be calculated by the program whenever the default attachment storage load (copied from the initialization diskette) is modified by the user. The checksum must be stored in attachment storage for comparison to the hardware calculated checksum. The following steps are required for the calculation:

- 1. Load a work register with 0's.
- Load the contents of bytes 4080 and 4081 (one word) into another work register.
- Add 1 to the value loaded into the second work register.
- 4. Subtract the contents of the second work register from the contents of the first work register.
- 5. Test the results to see if a borrow occurs. If a borrow occurs, subtract 1 from the first work register.
- Load the contents of bytes 4082 and 4083 (one word) into the second work register.
- 7. Add 1 to the value in the second work register.
- 8. Subtract the contents of the second work register from the contents of the first work register.
- Test the results to see if a borrow occurs. If a borrow occurs, subtract 1 from the first work register.
- 10. Continue this process, by repeating steps 6 through 9, for each successive word to be checksummed in attachment storage, up to and including attachment-storage locations 4F7C and 4F7D.
- Subtract 1 from the contents of the first work register.
- 12. Store the contents of the first work register (the checksum word) into attachment-storage locations 4F7E and 4F7F.

The following coding example may be used as a guide to calculate the checksum word:

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CHAPTER 4. LOADING A USER-DESIGNED OPERATING SYSTEM

A user-designed operating system can load the attachment storage load(s) required by the multi-function attachment(s). (One attachment storage load is associated with each multi-function attachment.) The Series/1 operator can then simply load (IPL) the operating system rather than loading programs from the initialization diskette. The operating system must:

- Have access to <u>all</u> attachment storage loads required by the multi-function attachments
- Have a loader program for the multi-function attachment on the Series/1 system

After the user configures an attachment storage load using the initialization diskette, the attachment storage load is stored on the initialization diskette. The user may copy these attachment storage loads into a user-designed operating system.

Two methods exist to obtain a copy. The user's program may:

 Read the configured program from the initialization diskette into processor storage and then transfer the copy to the operating system.

> Note: This method is the most flexible of the two. It places the least number of restrictions on the operating system and the operator.

• Use a copy utility program to copy the attachment storage loads, also called datasets, from the initialization diskette to a selected area of processor storage; the user's program then loads the operating system with the copied information.

HOW TO READ AN ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD

The header records are examined by the user program to determine the locations of the attachment storage loads on the initialization diskette.

In the header record, the beginning-of-extent field defines the start (first-used sector) of the attachment storage load dataset. The end-of-extent field defines the end (last-used sector) of the attachment storage load dataset. Both fields are defined in five bytes as follows:

СС	=	cylinder	01-76 in decimal EBCDIC
Н	=	head	0 or 1 in EBCDIC
RR	=	record	01-15 in decimal EBCDIC

The length of the program can be found by using the starting sector and the ending sector.

The operating system must have a loader program for the multi-function attachment feature. (See Appendix A for an example of a loader program.)

DISKETTE DESCRIPTION AND FORMAT

The diskette contains 77 cylinders numbered 00 (outermost) to 76 (innermost).

Each track is divided into 15 sectors, with 256 bytes per sector. Cylinder 0 is divided into 26 sectors with 128 bytes per sector. Sector numbers begin with 01 for the first sector after the index.

The volume label (VOL1), located on cylinder 0 sector 7 (read with head 0), is used to identify the volume, the owner, the security classification, the sequence, and the length of the physical records on the tracks of the volume.

VOL1 is a required label, formatted as shown on the following page.

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COPYING AN ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD USING A COPY UTILITY

The copy utility must be compatible with diskettes that contain:

- Standard Volume 1 labels
- Standard HDR1 header labels
- Data written 256 bytes-per-sector on both sides of the diskette

The following characteristics apply to the attachment storage loads on the initialization diskette:

- The volume identifier for the diskette is MFA
- The data set label for the default attachment storage load is MFACSIDT and is located on cylinder 0 sector 8 (read with head 0).
- The data set labels for each custom attachment storage load have the following format: MFACSIda, where da is equal to the base device address of the multi-function attachment associated with the load. The data set labels are located on cylinder 0 sectors 9-23 (read with head 0). If da=xx, this describes an empty data set.

LOADING AN ATTACHMENT STORAGE LOAD TO AN ATTACHMENT

The user may load attachment storage using the operations defined by the Start Control command if:

- An attachment storage load has been previously configured using the initialization diskette and the attachment storage load has been copied to a user-designed operating system.
- The default attachment storage load has been copied to a user-designed operating system.

Note: If the communications indicator panel is connected to the attachment, the DISPLAY/FUNCTION SELECT switches must be set off (00000) during attachment initialization.

Load Attachment Storage



This operation loads attachment storage with the data located at the address specified in DCB word 7. The data is loaded into attachment storage at the location specified in DCB word 1 (start address).

The attachment storage load operation resets attachment initialization. The DCB associated with an attachment storage load must specify the following:

- Bit 2 of the DCB control word is off.
- The byte count in DCB word 6 is within the maximum of F00 (3,840 decimal) bytes.
- The start address in DCB word 1 is hexadecimal 4080 or above up to and including 4F7F.

A device end interrupt follows successful operation. If the boundaries of the attachment storage are exceeded, a DCB specification check occurs.

INITIALIZE ATTACHMENT



Attachment storage must be loaded with an attachment storage load before the attachment can be initialized (successfully execute an initialize attachment operation). An initialize attachment operation must be issued before the attachment responds to operations other than those initiated by the Start Control command.

Bit 2 of DCB control word 0 must be 0, and the byte count must be 0; otherwise, a DCB specification check occurs.

The attachment performs an attachment storage ckecksum; and if it is not correct, an exception interrupt occurs.

LOAD ATTACHMENT STORAGE AND INITIALIZE



Note: Attachment storage must be loaded before the attachment can be initialized.

This operation performs a load attachment storage operation followed by an initialize attachment operation.

If a hardware failure occurs during any of the tests or checks that occur during this operation, the attachment does not initialize and an exception interrupt, with device-dependent status in the ISB is presented.

The attachment can exit the initialized state only after one of the following:

- A power-on reset
- Acceptance of a Start Control command that specifies a load attachment storage operation

The following shows an example of a multi-function attachment loader and initialization program. It may be used as a guide when writing the multi-function storage load to the Multi-function attachment storage.
