

Reference books

These books contain information on network planning, network growth, and services.

- Guide to System Administration Activities Helps you, the System Administrator, organize and control your installation, setup, and maintenance activities. This book is required reading for successful network administration.
- Activities Guide An empty binder for storing your completed worksheets, and Remote System Administration logs.
- Library Directory Contains the cumulative index for the Network Administration Library, a summary of services commands, a summary of services procedures, and a glossary.

Procedural books

These books contain complete procedures for the installation, setup, maintenance, backup, restore, and troubleshooting activities associated with each service.

- Services Installation and Setup Guide Helps you install and set up your services.
- Services Maintenance Guide Contains step-by-step procedures for maintenance tasks associated with your services.
- Backup and Restore Guide Contains step-by-step procedures for your backup and restore tasks.
- Basic Network Troubleshooting Contains step-by-step procedures and task-related information that help you identify, locate, describe, or solve a network services problem; or prepare to contact service or the System Customer Support Center. Basic Network Troubleshooting is composed of these three books:
 - MP Codes and Messages Lists the problem messages and maintenance panel codes that display on your maintenance panel or server terminal. This book includes remedial steps for each problem code or message, and may direct you to one of the other books in the Basic Network Troubleshooting set.
 - Fault Isolation Process Contains trouble isolation steps and remedial actions as directed from MP Codes and Messages.
 - Test and Diagnostic Tools Contains diagnostic tests and recovery procedures as directed from Fault Isolation Process and MP Codes and Messages.

access control groups

User groups categorized by the type of access controls assigned to them; categories include open groups, closed groups, and controlled groups.

access controls

Restrictions applied to network resources to control access to them. Protected resources include mailboxes, file drawers, PC File Service directories, Clearinghouse database objects, and ports connecting to remote hosts.

access list

A list of users or groups of users given access to specific services and other network objects.

access rights

Privilege levels assigned to protect network objects. Objects that have access rights associated with them are domains, organizations, user names, user group names, file drawers, PC File Service directories, and ports used in conjunction with outgoing gateways. Privileges are: read, write, add, remove, and change access list.

ACP

See asynchronous communications protocol.

activate

To specify that a service should automatically load and run each time the server is restarted. An activated service appears on the active services list.

active

The service state that exists when the service determines that all configuration information is available and validated.

active services

The services that load and run automatically during server initialization.

active working log

The working Communications Monitoring Service file that stores monitored data.

administrative access

An access right assigned to system administrators or other users responsible for network management. Users with this access right can perform functions that affect objects in the Clearinghouse database. Objects include organizations, domains, and groups.

administrator list

A list of fully qualified names associated with a Clearinghouse object. The Clearinghouse uses this list to verify access requests.

alias

An alternative to the local name; often used for quicker logon to workstations and for quicker mailing.

American Standard Code for Information Interchange

(ASCII) An 8-bit digital code set; 7 bits provide 128 characters of the standard typewriter keyboard; the eighth bit provides error checking. The code is used for information interchange among data processing systems, data communication systems, and associated equipment. Xerox provides workstation and services software that converts between ASCII and the Xerox Character Code.

analog transmission

The transmission of data using a varying signal or tone. Voice-grade telephone lines provide analog transmission.

anti-entropy

An operation automatically run by the Clearinghouse during non-peak hours to verify database validity. It performs the same function as the **Compare Database** command.

application

A software program that performs specialized tasks; server applications are called services.

architecture

The design or structure of a program or network.

archive

The process of storing an exact copy of data. A backup copy of data recorded on portable or remote media. Also a file transfer mode the Remote Batch Service uses to store data.

ASCII

See American Standard Code for Information Interchange.

ASCIIZ

A subset of ASCII which contains the letters A through Z, the numbers 0 through 9, and these characters: $2\% \%()_{-}$ Spaces are not valid ASCIIZ characters.

asynchronous

Transmission of data in which time intervals (synchronization) between successive bits can vary. Transmission is sent a character at a time, and is controlled by start and stop bits at the beginning and end of each character.

asynchronous communication protocol

(ACP) Optional software that allows compatible information exchange between workstations using emulation software and a remote host; runs with the External Communication Service.

asynchronous message

A Services Executive message announcing an error or status condition caused by a background or automatic operation. The message appears on all active executives.

asynchronous terminal

Refers to a type of terminal that communicates asynchronously across an RS232C connection.

attachment

Part or all of the message content of an XNS message. The SNA Mail Relay converts between XNS attachments and SNADS distribution objects.

attribute

A quality that describes an object or part of an object. In the Clearinghouse Service, attributes are fields in a record such as a user's alias. In the File Service, attributes are characteristics of a file such as its name, size, and date of creation.

authentication

The verification of user identification and access rights based on the information in the Clearinghouse database. autodial The capability of a modem and a port to dial a number

automatically.

autodialer The hardware installed at the port to allow automatic dialing.

auto-logging A process that automatically copies the log file to a File Service file drawer. Auto-logging is enabled in the Communications

Monitoring Service monitoring profile.

automatic backup An operation run automatically at the time and with the frequency

you select; available with rigid disk and cartridge tape systems.

automatic recovery facility See backstop software.

autostart circuit A circuit that is automatically started with the Internetwork

Routing Service.

availability The accessibility of a Clearinghouse domain throughout the

network. With multiple Clearinghouses, each domain is replicated on two or more servers so that in the event of server failure, the domain is still available. Also refers to the state of a

server monitored by the Server Monitor Service.

B

background Refers to a function the system performs without the need of user input.

backstop log The record of causes for system failure.

backstop software The automatic recovery software that records the reason for

system failure, reboots the server, and loads all services that were

active before the failure occurred.

backstop volume One of the three logical volumes on a server's physical volume.

This volume is used for holding files related to backstop.

backup The act of making remote copies of data in case the original data

is lost or unusable.

backup cycle A period of time expressed as a number of days during which a

complete snapshot of a File Service volume is made. The length of the cycle determines the type of media used, the amount of

time required, and the size of a single backup increment.

backup epoch The point in time after which only new and changed files must be

backed up incrementally.

backup file drawer A file drawer created to store the data produced by a volume

backup.

backup frequency The number of days that should pass before backup is run again.

backup increment A partial snapshot of the volume produced during a single

backup. Each time backup is executed, a backup increment or set of increments is created. If backup is performed often, the size of each increment is smaller and takes less space on the backup media (fewer floppy disks if backing up to a floppy). The set of increments produced during a given cycle constitutes a complete snapshot of the volume.

backup increments log

A record on the source volume that identifies the backup volume and the start time for each increment.

backup index

A list of files backed up in a given increment.

backup medium

The material used for storing backup data. The material may be floppy disks, cartridge tape, or a rigid disk. A rigid disk can be remote (another server on the network) or local (another File Service volume on the same multiple-drive server).

backup parameters

The set of variables defining the backup process. These parameters include the type of media used, the backup cycle and frequency, the start and stop times, and other variables related to the backup medium.

backup start time

The time to automatically start backup (applies only to rigid disk backup).

backup user/password

The name and password of the user whose identity is used for backup (rigid disk backup only). The backup user's identity allows access to the local or remote File Service during volume backup. The backup user must have full access to the backup file drawer.

backup volume

A volume used to store File Service backup information. Each backup volume has one File Service backup file drawer.

backup volume group

A group of File Service volumes used for backup. The group name is used to locate an accessible backup volume. The system examines volumes in the group in alphabetical order and uses the first available volume to store the data.

bad page

An area on the server's disk containing damaged or marginally usable media. The table records (automatically or manually) the addresses of the disk pages to prevent the system from using them. Pages known to be bad when the manufacturer releases the disc drive are recorded in the Manufacturer's Bad Page Table.

bad page table

A list of bad pages located on each disk drive connected to a server. The bad page table records the addresses of the damaged or marginally usable disk pages.

bad sector table

A list of bad sectors on the cartridge tape drive. The bad sector table records the addresses of damaged or marginally usable sectors.

banner sheet

A page produced by the Print Service containing information about the associated print request. Also referred to as the banner page or the break page.

basic services

The fundamental network services including Services System Software, Clearinghouse Service, Mail Service, File Service, PC File Service, and Print Service.

batch processing

A type of processing in which similar tasks are grouped and handled sequentially.

baud rate

The speed at which a computer transmits data (in bits per second). Two communicating terminals must use the same baud rates.

binary synchronous communication

(BSC) A byte synchronous data link control protocol developed by IBM that includes specific characters and procedures to control the connection. Also called *bisynchronous* and *bisync*. Xerox provides workstation and service software (the Remote Batch Service and the External Communication Service) to convert various terminal-specific BSC protocols to protocols that can be understood by Xerox workstations, servers, and printers.

bit

A binary digit; a unit of data which can have the value of 0 or 1. These units are combined into 8-bit bytes; each byte equals one character.

bits per second

The speed at which a device (modem) transmits a character.

bit synchronous

A type of synchronous data communications protocol in which data is synchronized by bit instead of by byte. Refers to optional software available with the ECS to support information exchange between workstations and a remote host. Synchronous point-to-point and synchronous data link control (SDLC) protocols are examples of bit synchronous protocols.

block

A group of characters or words transmitted as a single unit.

boot

To start or restart a server or workstation. Also the act of causing the server to clear its main memory and reload the operating system and the server software. The server automatic recovery mechanism (backstop software) boots the server automatically after a system failure.

boot diagnostics

A series of diagnostics run from a floppy disk or cartridge tape when the Boot Reset (B RESET) and Alternate B (ALT B) buttons are simultaneously pressed and the Alternate B button is released at maintenance panel code 0005.

boot file

Part of the Services System Software that contains the Pilot operating system and the server software. Also a Boot Service file that provides the bootable system for either the diagnostic or installation utility.

boot diagnostics

A series of diagnostics run from a floppy disk or cartridge tape when the Boot Reset (B RESET) and Alternate B (ALT B) buttons are simultaneously pressed and the Alternate B button is released at maintenance panel code 0005.

Boot Service

(BS) Software that provides the facility for etherbooting a diagnostics utility or a installation utility; lets users boot software over the network.

boot switches

Numbers that identify the type of boot to perform.

bridge

A link between two compatible networks.

broadcast

A transmission that all stations receive. Directed and expanding ring broadcasts reach all stations on the specified Ethernet

networks or those stations within a certain number of internetwork hops.

See binary synchronous communication. **BSC**

A unit of measurement regarding computer storage and files. A bvte byte is equal to eight bits, and represents a character, symbol, or operation.

byte synchronous

A type of protocol in which a sequence of successive 8-bit characters (bytes) are transmitted as a unit. Any single character is transmitted in an increment no smaller than a byte. Each byte is interpreted individually, and control characters can be sent at any point during the transmission. The protocol is available through the 8000/8090 port configuration.

Periods during which the External Mail Gateway can send mail to calling intervals

the specified domain.

cartridge tape A type of magnetic material used for data storage and loading

software onto the 8090 server.

cartridge tape drive The 8090 server's built-in tape drive used for installing server software, services applications, Boot Service data files, and Print

Service fonts. It is also used for File Service backup operations

and various server offline diagnostics.

central processing unit (CPU) The basic unit of a computer that interprets and executes instructions to control the computer's operation.

checksum A check in which groups of digits are summed and the total is

compared to a previously computed sum to verify if a change occurred during transmission or conversion.

circuit A connection between two Internetwork Routing Services

forming an internetwork link.

citizens Servers and workstations that are directly compatible with the

Xerox Network System protocols.

See Communication Interface Unit.

Clearinghouse database The specialized database maintained by the Clearinghouse Service

that serves as a global directory for the entire internetwork. The database is composed of the organization and one or more domains, which can consist of 200 to 300 users resident in the same geographical location. A domain can reside in several Clearinghouse databases, and each Clearinghouse database can

hold multiple domains. See domain.

Clearinghouse Service (CHS) Software that contains information about the network

community. It is a lookup directory service that maintains a database of all network objects including users, services, and

servers.

All system components use this system-wide directory to locate resources and registered objects. The Clearinghouse authenticates users when they access the network.

Clearinghouse system

Multiple Clearinghouses that communicate with each other to maintain accurate information about network resources.

client

Refers to a PC user who can access the server to store and retrieve files, and to share files with other network users through the PC File Service.

closed group

A user group that current members can leave; only Group Administrators can add members to this group.

closed volume

A File Service volume containing files that are not available to local or remote users.

cluster controller

A node in an SNA network that controls multiple devices, such as 3270 series terminals, letting them share a single phone line. A cluster controller is a physical unit (PU) type 2.

Clusternet Communications

An Internetwork Routing Service option that lets remote workstations access each other and other network services using voice-grade, dialed phone lines.

clusternet router

Part of the Internetwork Routing Service that provides routing information to the clusternet. The router uses the clusternetwork number and the host numbers of the remote workstation to route information to and from the clusternetwork ports.

clusternetwork

A collection of one or more RS232C ports assigned a network number to allow remote workstations access to the rest of the internetwork.

coaxial cable

A type of two-conductor cable used to link devices together; each conductor within the cable is insulated from the other.

communication

Refers to data transfer between devices and to activities that services carry out for their clients.

communication interface

The port or point of connection between a device and the medium which is to carry data between the device and another device. Examples of communications interfaces are RS232C, RS366, and parallel ports.

Communication Interface Unit

(CIU) The 873 Communication Interface Unit increases the number of RS232C ports on a network without requiring the addition of a server. The 873 CIU adds four external ports; the 873 CIU Extension Kit adds four more. The CIU attaches directly to the network, and can be configured for either asynchronous or bit synchronous communication (TTY, 3270 SNA, or IRS-to-IRS phone communications).

communication partner

A device (mainframe or word processor) with which the Remote Batch Service communicates.

communication services

The services that allow communications in the internetwork, between networks, and between networked and non-networked devices.

These include the External Communications Service, the Internetwork Routing Service, the Interactive Terminal Service, the Remote Batch Service, and the 850/860 Gateway Service.

Communications Monitoring Service

(CMS) Software that monitors the communication services and the Mail Service. The CMS keeps log files of service performance to support troubleshooting. The CMS provides three types of protocol monitoring: X.25, RS232C, and SNA.

compatibility services

Describes network services that act as gateways between networked and non-networked mainframe and personal computers. Compatibility services provide terminal emulation, document transfer, and network access functions. There are two compatibility services: the 850/860 Gateway Service and the Interactive Terminal Service.

complexity

A measure of the difficulty of printing a page or an entire document related to the image defined in an Interpress master. Several factors affect complexity, including the number of characters and fonts referenced; the number of graphic operations; the layers of objects on a page to produce the image; and the density of the image.

complex printing

A Print Service feature that enables the printing of more complex graphics. This feature is necessary for the printing of scanned images.

confidence test

An offline diagnostic test that determines if the magnetic media or the drive hardware is causing a problem.

configuration

See setup.

congestion

A condition that develops when the number of incoming calls exceeds the network or service capacity.

connection

The joining of two machines to allow information transfer; a virtual connection between two machines to deliver all parts of a message.

connection window

The parameters that control the hours of operation of the Remote Batch Service with respect to a particular communication partner.

Consultative Committee for International Telephone and Telegraph

(CCITT) An international group that creates recommendations for international telecommunications standards.

container

A file in the hierarchical file system which has other files associated with it and which logically contains those associated files. Files, file folders, file drawers, canvases, and desktops are examples of containers. Also referred to as a *directory*.

context

An operating level that, combined with the current logged on user status and the state of the server and service, determines the available commands.

controlled group

A user group that has controlled access; only the Group Administrator can add or remove members.

controller

In the context of the SNA or BSC Access, an SNA or BSC network node that the host expects at the far end of a telephone line. A controller consists of a set of logical units, plus low-level SNA or BSC communication software. Each controller communicates through a single RS232C port and telephone line.

conversion

The ability to change information from one format to another for data transmission; the translation between two formats or protocols that are foreign to each other but accomplish similar functions. Usually, gateways translate between foreign transmission protocols and the XNS low-level transmission protocols. Sometimes gateways convert foreign character sets to the XNS character set and visa versa.

copy volume

Refers to a backup operation in which the File Service volume is completely copied in 45 minutes to four hours depending on the volume size; also called a *complete backup*.

coresidency

A condition where two or more services are installed and activated on the same server. The 8000 and 8090 servers support multiple services running on the same server at the same time. Some services cannot coreside.

cover sheet

A mail note that accompanies a document.

credentials

A network entity name and password supplied to workstations during logon. The workstation validates the credentials through the CHS and presents them to other services to allow access to protected resources.

CRC

See cyclic redundancy check.

CRT

An abbreviation for cathode ray tube; describes a type of display monitor.

current log file

A working file to which captured data is written during logging. If logging is stopped, the current log file is the one to which data was last written. When logging is started again, the other working log file will become the current log file. The current log file is said to be active during logging and not active if logging is stopped.

cyclic redundancy check

(CRC) A method of error detection the Internetwork Routing Service uses to determine the number of packets not received because of errors in transmission.

D

data bits

The bits that make up a character in asynchronous transmission. Each transmitted character is preceded by a start bit and followed by a stop bit.

Data Circuit Terminal Equipment

(DCE) Part of the data communications structure, called the DTE/DCE interface, in which both ends of the communication path can send and receive.

data files

Files that provide the configuration parameters to one or more services or to the server profile.

data set ready

(DSR) Refers to the operational condition of the modem (data set).

Data Terminal Equipment

(DTE) Part of the data communications structure, called the DTE/DCE interface, in which both ends of the communication path can send and receive.

database

A file or collection of files containing system parameters or a statistical log of activities. The system constantly updates the contents of this file.

database structure

Refers to the hierarchical organization of the CHS database. The top-most level contains an organization and its associated data, such as the administrator list. Each organization contains domains and their associated data. Each domain contains network objects and associated information, such as aliases, passwords, and network addresses.

DCA

See Document Content Architecture.

DDXF (DECnet/SNA DISOSS Document Exchange Facility)

A VMS-based tool that lets VAX mail system users exchange mail with DISOSS users. DDXF implements DIA (Document Interchange Architecture) for this mail exchange. The Xerox DEC/SNA Mail Tool communicates with DDXF to allow XNS users to exchange mail with DISOSS users.

decomposing

Interpreting the information in the Interpress document and referencing the fonts. Rotation, scaling, or conversion of fonts may be performed during this phase. Also called *formatting*.

dedicated line

A type of communication circuit, such as a leased line, that remains connected and does not have to be dialed. Often used for internetwork links and mainframe connections for 3270 emulation.

default

A preset value supplied by the software.

default host

The emulated cluster controller activated when the External Communication Service starts. The default host is associated with and named after a specific remote host that supports 3270 communication. The ECS host entry and the RS232C port entry together define the default host.

default substitution font

The font supplied by the Print Service when a specified font is not available. The default substitution font may be from either the Modern or the Classic family.

degradation

Describes the reduced performance of a server caused by an increase or change in use.

DEN

See Distribution Element Name.

dependency

See interservice dependency.

descendant

A file or directory that is directly or indirectly contained by a given directory in a hierarchical file structure.

desktop

Describes the ViewPoint working environment which provides the user interface and the filing hierarchy of a directory. The desktop directory includes icons representing documents, folders, file drawers, printers, inbaskets, outbaskets, and terminal-emulation (TTY) devices. Users can store desktops on a File Service volume and later retrieve them.

desktop area

A location in the Services Volume where ViewPoint copies desktops during a desktop backup operation.

destination drive

The rigid disk drive containing the filing volume that will receive information from the source drive during a File Service copy volume backup.

DGN

DIA

diagnostics

See Distribution Group Name.

See **Document Interchange Architecture**.

Programs that test server hardware. Diagnostics are available through an external magnetic media (offline diagnostics) through the server rigid disk as part of the Services System Software (online diagnostics).

diagnostics utility

Programs supplied by the Boot Service that provide diagnostic procedures for workstations, and servers with rigid disk and with large-capacity secondary rigid disks.

dialer

See autodialer.

dial-up

Refers to the ability of an external device to use a phone link to communicate with a network service.

digital transmission

A form of data transmission in which characters and words are represented by numbers. The numbers are expressed in the form of on/off electronic pulses.

directory

An object in the hierarchical file system containing any number of files or any number of nested subdirectories. Directories can be direct descendants of file drawers or of other directories. Also referred to as a container.

directory name

See filename.

See drive.

disk diagnostics

A set of tests used to troubleshoot server hardware.

disk drive

disk exerciser test

A diagnostic test for medium or large capacity drives on the 8000 server. This test provides statistics indicating how usable the drive is.

disk pack

The removable magnetic storage medium used in a large capacity 8000 server configuration. On a removable disk server, a disk pack may be inserted or removed from the disk drive. On a fixed disk server, the disk is permanently mounted.

disk page

A unit of measurement which defines disk storage and file size; a disk page equals 512 bytes.

distinguished name

First part of the three-part fully qualified name; see local name.

distributed

Describes the cooperative environment of the XNS architecture, where system elements work together to share server and service resources and data from different computers. Refers to the logical interconnection of multiple, separate networks into a single network.

distributed database

A shared and automatically updated file of information that exists in internetworks involving two or more Clearinghouse Services. The file contains information regarding network objects.

Distributed Information Service Office Support System

(DISOSS) The IBM host application with which SNA Access communicates.

distributed processing

Refers to network resources that can be shared between many users, including users at remote sites.

Distribution Element Name

(DEN) An individual SNADS user. Also referred to as a user ID.

Distribution Group Name

(**DGN**) A group of SNADS mail users. Also referred to as user set. The SNA Mail Relay maintains a set of DGN-to-XNS domain mappings for relaying mail from SNADS to XNS networks.

Distribution Interchange Unit

(DIU) An entire SNADS mail object. The DIU consists of a prefix, suffix, control information, and the distribution object itself. Control information includes the source and destination DUNs, service level indicators, a message field for memos, and other data to process the mail. The SNA Mail Relay converts between XNS envelopes and SNADS control information.

distribution list

A user group registered in the Clearinghouse, listing recipients for electronic mail.

distribution object

The mailed document in a SNADS-based mail system. The distribution object becomes part of the DIU. The SNA Mail Relay converts between the distribution object and the message without modifying the document contents.

Distribution Service Unit

(DSU) A node in a SNADS network.

Distribution User Name

(DUN) The combination of DGN and DEN that uniquely identifies a SNADS user. Equivalent of the XNS fully qualified name. When an XNS user sends mail to a SNADS user, the DUN--with a percent sign between DGN and DEN--becomes the first component of the SNADS recipient's fully qualified name.

DIU

See Distribution Interchange Unit.

document

A non-directory file, usually created at a workstation, containing text and graphics.

Document Content Architecture

(DCA) The IBM definition of a document's format.

document format

The structure of a document as it is stored in computer memory and interpreted by software. Document formats can differ in character codes, such as ASCII or EBCDIC, and in control codes for page formatting. Documents of one format cannot be directly interpreted by software that creates documents of a different format. The Remote Batch Service provides document interchange between XNS users and IBM users.

document interchange

A mode the Remote Batch Service uses to provide document format and structure compatibility between the network and the communication partners.

Document Interchange Architecture

(DIA) The IBM protocol defining a document's structure as it is packaged for electronic mail.

document profile

A DIA-specified header that accompanies a file and defines its format. In the SNADS-to-XNS direction, the SNA Mail Relay builds XNS file attributes from document profiles; for XNS-to-SNA, the SNA Mail Relay uses XNS filing attributes to create document profiles.

domain

A logical grouping (usually geographical) of objects registered in the Clearinghouse database. The data maintained for a particular domain includes the list of Domain Administrators, plus the names of and data describing the objects registered in the domain.

Domain Administrator

A user with specific privileges, responsible for setting up and maintaining entries within a given domain. Only the Organization Administrator can create a domain.

domain name

The second part of the fully qualified name. The domain names must be unique within an organization.

dots per inch

(DPI) Also referred to as spots per inch (SPI). See resolution.

drive

The physical device used to access the storage or installation medium. The medium may be a floppy disk, cartridge tape, or disk pack. Each server has one fixed disk drive and a floppy disk drive or a cartridge tape drive.

drop cable

The cable used to connect the transceiver to a workstation, server, or other device on the network.

DSU

See Distribution Service Unit.

DUN

See Distribution User Name.

duplexity

The mode of two-way transmission over a single communication path. See **full duplex** and **half duplex**.

E

850/860 Information Processing System

Workstations that can use a Shared Interface Unit to connect to the network or a phone link to access the 850/860 Gateway Service. 850/860 Gateway Service

(GWS) Software that lets non-networked 850 and 860 Information Processing Systems use the Mail Service to exchange information with other workstations on the network.

electronic printer

A device that transfers a digital image to the printing medium (usually plain paper). See **laser printer**.

Electronic Printing System (4050/9700/8700)

The family of high-speed Xerox printing systems that are available to support XNS print services.

emulation

Imitation of one system by another to exchange data. Emulation provides access to a host system in a way familiar to the host system.

enabled

The user status that provides administrative access to all service commands. This status is only granted to administrators of the server's Clearinghouse domain.

ENQs

Enquiries sent by the 850/860 Gateway Service requesting that data be sent again.

envelope

The control information portion of a mail message or of a packet sent over the Internetwork Routing Service.

epoch

The point in time after which only new and changed files must be backed up incrementally.

erasing

To use an online cartridge tape or high capacity cartridge tape utility to delete existing data from a tape.

error log

A list of recorded hardware errors.

etherbooting

The process of booting software over the Ethernet.

Ethernet

Refers to the high-speed local area network (LAN) that carries information to workstations and servers attached to it. The Ethernet standard specifies the two lowest layers of a network architecture: a Data Link Layer and a Physical Layer. Developed by Xerox Corporation, Intel Corporation, and Digital Equipment Corporation.

Ethernet network

The cable, network stations, transceivers, repeaters (if necessary), and all other components that comprise a single network site as specified by the Ethernet Standard. An XNS network comprises one or more Ethernet networks, each of which has at least one server running Services System Software and various services. Each site also has a number of network workstations using communications software to send client requests to XNS servers.

Ethernet number

The unique number associated with each Ethernet network. No two Ethernet networks that are a part of a single, multinet configuration have the same Ethernet number.

event

A condition that represents a change in availability of a server.

event log

A file that the SNA Access creates on a server's rigid disk to record events, such as the starting and stopping of a controller, and error messages.

event recipient

A monitoring server that is registered with a monitored server to receive event information.

event site

A server that is monitored using the Server Monitor Service.

Event Site Reporting

(ESR) An option that enables the Server Monitor Service to monitor leased or dial-up circuits controlled by the Internetwork Routing Service.

executive

A program that supports interactive access to server functions to analyze server performance or change server configuration. The server terminal provides the local executive. ViewPoint Remote System Administration provides a remote executive interface.

exercise floppy test

A diagnostic test that creates a diagnostic floppy disk for testing the floppy disk drive. The test randomly writes, reads, and verifies data.

expunging a service

An operation that removes a service from a server, deletes any files created during or after service installation, and removes any Clearinghouse entries associated with the service.

extended binary coded decimal interchange code

(EBCDIC) An eight-bit computer code representing 256 unique letters, numbers, and special characters.

extended language fonts

Refers to the Xerox Japanese Modern Fonts and the Xerox Japanese Classic Fonts. Chinese fonts are incorporated into the Japanese font sets.

extension

A one to three character string placed after the period in a filename or directory name.

External Communication Service

(ECS) Software that supports information exchange between XNS devices and non-XNS devices. The ECS enables network workstation access to mainframe computers through terminal emulation by emulating three kinds of terminals: 3270 BSC and 3270 SNA synchronous terminals, and standard asynchronous-type terminals. The ECS also manages Communication Interface Units used for Internetwork Routing Service circuits.

External Mail Gateway

(EMG) An optional feature of the Mail Service which enables mail exchange between two mail systems residing in separate networks.

F

facsimile

(FAX) A system of communications in which a document, photograph, map, or other fixed graphic material is scanned. The information is converted into signal waves for transmission by wire or radio to a facsimile receiver at a remote point. Then the image is scanned and reconstructed at the receiving station, and duplicated onto paper.

fault analysis test

A diagnostic test for the 8000 medium capacity or 8090 low capacity drives that reports errors with the fixed disk.

file Any object stored in the XNS file system including documents, file drawers, and folders. A file is made up of two parts: its

attributes and its content.

file attributes Values that define the format of a file.

file drawer A directory defined and maintained by the File Service and

associated with a user (owner) on the network. File drawers act as containers where users store and retrieve files. File drawer access can be limited to a single user (private) or open to a group (public). The System Administrator limits the size of the file drawer, but there are no limits on the number of file folders

within this size.

filename The name of a file or directory. An MS-DOS file or directory

name consists of a one to eight character ASCIIZ filename, optionally followed by an ASCII period and a one to three

character ASCIIZ extension.

filename translation A background function performed by the PC File Service to

convert names of files from the XNS filename structure to the

MS-DOS filename structure.

File Service (FS) Software that acts as a centralized storage and organization

service for files. It lets users share files produced at any networked or non-networked workstation. The File Service is also used to back up the Clearinghouse Service, Mail Service,

Librarian Service, and Server Monitor Service.

file subtree A directory and all of its descendants.

file system Refers to a structured collection of files, or to the software that

defines and maintains the files and their structure. The XNS file system provides a tree-structured hierarchy of files, all contained

on a single volume managed by the File Service.

file system root See volume root.

file type A file attribute field that refers to the structure and format of a

file. Examples of file types include ViewPoint, ViewPoint folder,

860, or Unspecified.

filing object attributes Values associated with a filing object.

filing objects File drawers, folders (directories), and documents (files) in the

filing hierarchy.

filing object names Names users give to files, directories, file drawers, and volume

roots. The volume root name is equivalent to a File Service

volume or File Service name.

filing session An extended connection during which a user can access a

specified filing object and perform several filing tasks.

filing threshold Refers to a maximum number of files which can be stored in a

specific location. In addition to File Service limits, the Communications Monitoring Service monitoring profile controls the maximum number of log files that can be stored to a remote

directory.

filing volume The Services Volume on a server's rigid disk.

firmware Programs, usually operating systems, that are stored in ROM (read-only memory) and cannot be changed in any way.

Describes the disk medium that cannot be removed from the fixed drive.

floppy disk A flexible, removable magnetic disk medium used for data storage and loading software onto the workstation and server.

A peripheral in an 8000 series server used to access floppy disks. floppy disk drive

A method by which two communicating devices adjust the data flow control flow between them to maximize the communication channel and prevent overloading the receiving device with incoming data.

A directory that contains other files (documents and folders) folder created at a workstation. A folder stored on a File Service may be contained within a file drawer or a folder.

Typographical design applied to a collection of letters and graphic symbols that share certain characteristics such as style, weight, and stress.

font rotation To turn fonts to a required angle to print a document.

font

foreign

format

formatting

font substitution

foreign domain

Foreign Gateway Assistant

foreign internetwork

To use another font in place of the specified (and presumably unavailable) font. For the Print Service, the default substitution font is either from the Modern or the Classic family.

Describes devices that are not compatible with the XNS communication protocol standards such as personal computers, IBM mainframes, and non-networked VAX systems.

A domain in a foreign internetwork that is accessed using the External Mail Gateway option of the Mail Service.

(FGA) An installable option that coresides with the Mail Service External Mail Gateway option. The FGA is an extension of a mail relay gateway. The FGA extracts mail from the External Mail Gateway forwarding queue and places it in a mailbox. The mail relay service retrieves the mail and then processes it for transfer to a foreign gateway.

A Xerox internetwork that is separate from your internetwork.

The arrangement or layout of data on magnetic media.

Refers to an online floppy disk or cartridge tape utility that prepares the magnetic media to receive data. Also describes the interpretation of the information in the Interpress master which includes referencing the fonts. Rotation, scaling, or conversion of fonts may be performed during this phase. The term also refers to formatting done by the Formatting Print Service. Also called decomposing.

Formatting Print Service

(FPS) Software that provides printing of detailed graphics, equations and text on Xerox production printers. It converts Interpress masters containing Interpress vector graphics into the proper format for printing on a 4050, 8700, or 9700 printer.

4050, 8700, or 9700 Electronic Printing System

The family of high-speed Xerox printing systems that are available to support XNS print services.

forwarder

The part of the Formatting Print Service that causes the transfer of the interleaved Interpress master to the Target Print Service.

forwarding

To transfer a message from one Mail Service to another to deliver it to the mailbox of its intended recipient.

forward queue

A temporary holding place for mail waiting to be forwarded to another Mail Service.

frame

A preset number of data bits transmitted as a unit.

FS volume

A filing volume that is registered in the Clearinghouse Service so it can be accessed over the network.

FS volume access

Privileges that allow users to copy files from the working directory of a server to an FS volume and retrieve files from an FS volume to the working directory.

full access

Describes all types of access to a file drawer: read, write, add, remove, and change access list.

full duplex

Describes a type of communication protocol that permits transmission of a signal in two directions at the same time.

fully qualified name

The name of an object or an individual registered in the Clearinghouse. A fully qualified name contains three parts: the local name or alias; the domain name; and the organization name.

G

gateway

A node shared by two or more networks through which data flows from network to network. Also describes services that transform communication protocols and information formats between systems with different architectures. See **compatibility services**.

gateway queue

A temporary holding place for mail leaving a Mail Service using the External Mail Gateway option. The External Mail Gateway Foreign Gateway Assistant moves the mail from the gateway queue to the SNA Mail Relay mailbox.

Gateway Service

(**GWS**) Provides non-networked 850/860 workstations access to the Mail Service to exchange information with other workstations on the network.

Genesis installation

Installing server and services software on the first server on an Ethernet network.

Genesis Internetwork Routing Service installation

Installing server or services software on a server to be connected to another network using an Internetwork Routing Service link.

Genesis Mode

A state that occurs on a multiple-server network during the installation of the first server, and on a single-server network after a non-normal server startup at interrupt point 2 or 3. This mode also acts as a booting facility when the server is restarted non-normally and when a Clearinghouse is not available for validation. In all cases, access is given to a limited set of commands that would normally be restricted.

germ file

A Boot Service file that loads a boot file into memory and starts its execution.

global

Describes the portion of each CHS database that is identical to that of all other Clearinghouse databases in the same internetwork. Also describes an External Mail Gateway that spans multiple Mail Services.

Greeter

An External Communication Service function that displays a menu to remote personal computer or other terminal users accessing Remote System Administration or connecting to the Interactive Terminal Service.

group

See user group.

group access

Privilege levels assigned to all members of a group. Access levels categorize the groups as open, closed, or controlled.

Group Administrator

The user who can determine group membership and assign privilege levels; each group should have two group administrators.

group list

A list of users with specific access rights maintained by the Clearinghouse.

Н

half duplex Describes a type of communication protocol that permits transmission of a signal in two directions, but not at the same

time.

hard read errors Errors reading a magnetic media that are not correctable.

Refers to the physical wiring of devices or circuits to perform a hard-wired

particular function.

HashTable file One of the three files of a Librarian Service database; contains an

index of the Records file.

hexadecimal A number system with a base of 16; digits range from 0 through

9 and A through F.

hierarchical structure Describes the XNS file system structure which offers an infinite

nesting capability. There are no constraints on the levels of

directories that can descend from the root, the length of a filing object name, or the pathname leading to an object.

hierarchy

A specified rank or order; refers to the file system structure.

high-capacity cartridge tape

A portable magnetic storage medium used in a 8090 high-capacity cartridge tape drive.

high-level data link control

(HDLC) A set of procedures specified by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) defining link access across the DTE/DCE interface; the functional layer within the X.25 protocol that controls the flow of data on a communication line.

home File Service

The File Service assigned to an individual to access or store user-related data. The home File Service assignment is part of the user information maintained by the Clearinghouse.

hops

The number of Internetwork Routing Services a packet encounters during transmission from one network to another within an internetwork; same as *steps*.

host

A mainframe computer (either an IBM 3270 BSC or 3270 SNA) that is accessed by network users. Describes a communication partner for sending and receiving files.

host element

A synonym for a device that has been assigned a 48-bit ID and can function as both the source and destination of packets. Servers, workstations, 860 Information Processing Systems, 820-II Personal Computers, and PCs are all host elements. Also referred to as system elements.

host entry

Information stored in the local External Communication Service and in the Clearinghouse database that describes an emulated cluster controller (default host). The controller is associated with and named after a specific remote host that supports 3270 communication. The host entry and the RS232C port entry define the default host.

icons

Graphic symbols representing all of the objects in ViewPoint software such as files, file drawers, inbaskets, outbaskets, printers, and terminal-emulation (TTY) devices.

idle

The state that exists when the service attempts to start and the configuration information is either not available or not validated.

image gaps

The blank strips running horizontally across a page of an 8040 Series printout, or vertically across a page of an NS 8000 Laser CP printout. Image gaps usually occur when generation of complex images or graphics cannot keep up with the speed of the printer.

inbound list

A list of mail gateways that receive incoming mail from users in foreign domains. The list includes the phone number and geographic location of the gateway along with the names of the local domains receiving mail.

inbound mail gateway

An External Mail Gateway which handles incoming mail from foreign internetworks for a selected set of domains in its own internetwork.

increment

Data stored on a File Service that represents changes or additions since the last incremental backup.

incremental backup

A partial snapshot of the volume.

information buffer

A temporary storage place containing a list of data last read or written.

initialization

Actions performed after a service is first installed on a server; the actions include naming the service, ensuring it registers itself with the Clearinghouse, and supplying configuration information specific to that service. Also the process of naming a floppy disk, cartridge tape, or high-capacity cartridge tape prior to its use.

initialize

To use a high capacity cartridge tape utility to prepare a new or used tape for receive data.

input file drawer

A file drawer assigned exclusively to the Remote Batch Service to store jobs or documents for transmission to the communication partner.

input queue

A temporary holding place for mail posted to a local Mail Service or forwarded from another Mail Service.

installation utility

A program supplied by the Boot Service that lets users configure, install, and upgrade workstation software over the network.

installer utility

The utility program used to initialize a server's clock/calendar card, partition a rigid disk into three logical volumes, install Services System Software, and select the desired recovery option.

integration

Refers to the network's ability to resolve hardware and software incompatibilities so network users can access information from non-Xerox computers and other networks.

interactive

Describes a program that elicits a user's response by presenting an on-screen prompt and then reacts immediately to the user's input.

Interactive Terminal Service

(ITS) Software that provides access to the Mail Service, Print Service, and File Service for non-networked users of TTY-like terminals or personal computers emulating teletypewriters. The remote user communicates with the ITS through a modem and phone line, and is validated through the Clearinghouse Service. The ITS requires the ECS be installed with the Asynchronous Protocol option.

interconnectivity

Refers to the ability of multiple networks to act as a single, logical network.

interleaved Interpress master

An Interpress master which contains text and graphic elements. It refers to the converted master produced by the Print Service when it is configured as a Formatting Print Service.

internal loopback test

A diagnostic test that checks out the RS232C port hardware.

International Organization for Standardization

(ISO) An industry organization that standardizes codes representing alphabetic, numeric, and special characters.

internetwork

A composite of interconnected networks in which network resources are shared. A network can have multiple connections to other networks. Same as *internet*.

internetwork communication path

Any communication path between networks, including servers, CIU's, networked workstations, and telephone lines.

internetwork link

An IRS circuit joining two networks making them logically a part of the same internetwork.

Internetwork Routing Service

(IRS) Software that provides network users access to all services and the ability to communicate with other networks. An IRS is installed on each connected network. Changes to an IRS are automatically broadcast throughout the internetwork. The IRS provides the X.25 Communication Protocol option and the Clusternet Communication option.

interpress

A Xerox standard which defines the digital representation of files that are printed using the Print Service.

interpreted

A file transfer mode the Remote Batch Service uses. To transfer a document, the RBS translates it from a format it understands to a format understood by non-Xerox systems (EBCDIC DP or EBCDIC WP). To receive a document, it converts the data to its own format.

interrupt point

A stopping point in the server initialization sequence that gives the System Administrator access to administrative commands. Activities that can be performed after the interrupt include scavenging, or copying volumes, examining the backstop log, installing or upgrading services, changing software options or profile values, and activating, deactivating, or expunging services. These interrupt points are available after a non-normal server startup:

- Interrupt before opening primary volume
- Interrupt before processing profile
- Interrupt before running services

interservice dependency

A condition that exists when one service cannot perform a particular function without the help of another service.

job

See task.

Job Control Language

In the Remote Batch Service, the instructions to the communication partner regarding how to perform the job and the type of output expected.

key The password associated with each registered object.

L

large capacity drive

A removable rigid disk drive for the 8000 server. Available in 80 Mb or 300 Mb drive configurations.

laser printer

A device that transfers a digital image to the printing medium (usually plain paper). Xerographic laser printers cast pulses of light onto an electrically charged photoreceptor. The digital image controls the pulses to produce the desired output. Where light strikes the photoreceptor, the electrical charge is neutralized. The photoreceptor then passes through toner which attaches to the remaining electrically charged areas. The resulting image is transferred to and fused onto the medium to produce the output. Also referred to as an *electronic printer*.

leased line

A communication line leased for dedicated use.

libject

The library objects the Librarian Service uses to keep track of shared data.

Librarian Service

(LS) Software that works together with the File Service to control access to shared data.

Librarian Service database

The database that contains the authentication level and the list of users with read and write access rights; used to control access to shared data. The database also contains information identifying the shared documents and tracking their availability.

line speed

The rate at which a modem transmits data across an asynchronous communications link; measured in bits per second.

link

The means of connecting one location to another in order to transmit information.

list bad pages

A diagnostic utility for the 8000 server that enters the number of bad disk pages in the bad page table.

local

Refers to a system element, such as a file, a database, or a physical component, that is attached to or stored at the computer.

local area network

(LAN) A data communications network that allows computers, terminals, and other data processors to share resources and processing power.

local console

The serial CRT directly connected to the server.

local log file

A copy of the last full working log file stored in the working directory of the server containing the Communications Monitoring Service.

local name The first part in the three-part fully qualified name.

local port Describes the port installed at the server as compared to those

accessible over the network.

log bad page A diagnostic test for the 8090 server that records the number of a

damaged or marginally usable page on the cartridge tape drive or

high capacity disk drive in the bad page table.

log file One of the three files of a Librarian Service database; records the

transactions since the last database backup. Also the Communications Monitoring Service file that contains information

regarding communication service performance.

logged on status
The user status that provides access to an added layer of service

commands.

logical Refers to a non-physical object within the network such as a file

drawer, a domain, or a user mailbox.

logical unit (LU) The means within the SNA environment through which a

user or an application can access the network.

logoff The process of stopping a session on a computer system.

logon The process of starting a session on a computer system.

lookup service Describes the ability of the Clearinghouse Service to locate the

name of any object registered in its database.

low capacity drive A series of fixed disk drives for the 8090 server. Available in 25

or 85 Mb configurations.

M

mail clerk A user who checks the gateway mailbox and forwards 850/860

mail to network users.

mail form A form used by 860 Information Processing System users to send

plain text and graphic enhanced documents.

mail group Groups used to create mail distribution lists.

mail note A plain text message without graphics. ViewPoint software

distinguishes a mail note from a document. When a mail note accompanies a document, it is referred to as a cover sheet. For SNADS-to-XNS mail, the SNA Mail Relay translates the contents of the DIU's message field into a mail note. For XNS-to-SNADS mail, the SNA Mail Relay converts a mail note into an DCA

document.

Mail Service (MS) Software that is directly accessible to all networked

workstations, and to any non-networked device that can dial up the appropriate compatibility service. The Mail Service uses the Clearinghouse Service to provide addresses and distribution lists

to deliver mail and the Internetwork Routing Service (IRS) to

route messages to other networks. The Mail Service requires a File Service to back up its database.

Mail Service database

The information stored by the Mail Service on the server disk, including mailboxes, their contents, and messages queued for forwarding and delivery.

mail system

The union of all Mail Services in an internetwork to provide a single mail transport system.

mailbox

A storage place for mail messages awaiting delivery to a client.

mainframe

A computer system that supports a large number of devices, applications, and users, and is able to process jobs in batch mode.

main memory

Typically, the fastest storage device of a computer; its main function is to execute instructions to the system.

maintenance

Additions, modifications, or updates to network hardware and software to keep it functioning properly. Regularly backing up services is a critical aspect of network maintenance. Analyzing the statistics gathered by various services also aids in maintenance.

maintenance panel code

A numeric code that displays on the server's front panel to indicate normal operation, a hardware problem, or a diagnostic test. Also called an MP code.

mapping

In the server profile, the SNA Mail Relay maintains routes or mappings used to deliver mail. For XNS-to-SNADS mail, the routes are from foreign domains to DGNs. For SNADS-to-XNS mail, the routes are from DGNs to XNS domains. Both are also used to construct appropriate recipient names.

marker

A term describing the part of the Print Service that causes the transfer of the image to the medium, as in placing marks on the paper. It is also referred to as the imaging subsystem.

mass storage device

A high density disk drive.

master

A file written according to the Xerox Interpress standard. It precisely describes the desired appearance of a page that has been completely composed by some other process. It is the Interpress master which, when executed by an Interpress printer, produces a printed image.

media scan test

A test that scans a formatted rigid disk to identify physically damaged disk pages. This test reports the address of the bad pages so that they can be recorded in the bad page table.

medium

The material or device used to store data; the type of interconnecting cable used in a network; or the type of material to which the print engine transfers the image such as thermal recording paper or plain paper.

medium capacity drive

A series of rigid disk drives for the 8000 server that are fixed. They include 10, 29, or 42 Mb configurations.

merging internetworks

Combining one internetwork with another by establishing a link between a pair of Internetwork Routing Services (one on each internetwork). The Clearinghouse databases of each internetwork are also merged.

message

A file submitted to the Mail Service for delivery to one or more network objects. Also refers to a sequence of packets or datagrams that expresses a full request or reply to a network application.

message heading

The portion of a undelivered mail message returned to the sender or, if that fails, sent to the local Postmaster mailbox. The heading contains only the subject, recipient list, and other information to identify the message.

microcode file

A Boot Service file that provides the basic instructions to the hardware.

modem

Short for modulator/demodulator. At the sending end, a modem converts (modulates) digital information into analog signals, which can be sent over phone lines. At the receiving end, a modem converts (demodulates) the analog signals back into digital information, which can be understood by computers, workstations, or servers.

modem emulator

A device that enables local communication between devices without converting digital signals to analog signals.

modem loopback test

A diagnostic test that checks the operation of the RS232C synchronous functions.

monitored server

A server whose availability and performance is monitored by the Server Monitor Service.

monitoring profile

The set of parameters that describes the type of monitoring and logging you want the Communications Monitoring Service to perform. The monitoring profile is stored in the Communications Monitoring Service section of the server profile.

monitoring server

A server that is running the Server Monitor Service.

MP code

See maintenance panel code.

MPOK

See Multiport Options Kit.

multi-drop

A leased communications channel that accommodates multiple devices.

multi-net

Refers to configurations comprised of several Ethernet networks.

multi-tasking

A feature of the XNS operating system and of the server environment that makes it possible for multiple services to run concurrently.

multilingual support software

The mapping capability that supports input and output in several languages.

multiple-drive server

Describes a server that is configured with multiple drives containing the primary and secondary volumes.

multiple-server network

Refers to an interconnected network containing several servers

each of which is running Services System Software.

multiplexing

The ability of many circuits to share a single physical link. The circuits appear to be using the link at the same time although

only one circuit is actually enabled at any instant.

Multiport Option Kit

(MPOK) The Multiport Option Kit extends the local port to four It can be configured to run a synchronous or bi-synchronous communication protocols (IRS, Clusternet, 3270)

SNA, External Mail Gateway, and X.25).

N

NAK Negatively acknowledged; a signal sent during data transmission

indicating data was not received.

net share The act of offering a filing or printing resource to the network

network The physical and logical connection of system elements.

network architecture The organizational concept and physical structure that lets

network community Refers to the elements that communicate on the same network

network entity Another term for object.

network name The name that identifies a filing or printing resource on the

server.

network number See Ethernet number.

network object Another term for object.

network resource See resource.

network server A server running the Services System Software and one or more

services.

networked workstation A computer that can access the resources of the network.

> node Describes a computer attached to a network.

Programs stored on the server rigid disk to check the server online diagnostics

hardware. See diagnostics.

A state of a File Service volume which makes the volume online volume

A user group that individuals can join or leave at will. open group

A state of a File Service volume. A volume that is open and open volume

offline is only available for local System Administrator activities. A volume that is open and online is available to all network users.

organization A high-level logical grouping of domains in the Clearinghouse

database (usually corresponding to an entire company or equivalent). Most internetworks contain only a single organization. A Clearinghouse Service maintains the following

data for each organization it serves: the list of organization administrators, the list of its domains, and the names of all Clearinghouse Services that serve each of these domains.

Organization Administrator

The user (or members of a group) with administrative access rights to set up and maintain an organization. Tasks include creating and maintaining the Organization Administrator's list of users, creating new domains, deleting obsolete domains, and deleting the last instance of the only domain in a given organization.

organization name

The third part of the fully qualified name which identifies the top level in the Clearinghouse database hierarchy.

outbound mail gateway

A Mail Service gateway that handles outgoing mail from its own internetwork for a selected set of domains in a foreign internetwork.

output file drawer

A file drawer assigned exclusively to the RBS to receive jobs or documents from the communication partner.

owner

An internetwork user associated with a file drawer; an owner has full access rights to the file drawer.

P

packet

A block of data for transmission. Packets include control characters to provide routing and error checking. Large amounts of data are divided into smaller packets for transmission.

packet switching

Refers to the technique used by packet switched data networks to transfer data in a series of fixed-length blocks from one location to another.

packet switched data network

(**PSDN**) A public network accessed through the X.25 protocol which is implemented by the Internetwork Routing Service. Telenet, Tymnet, and Japan's DDX are all examples of PSDNs.

page

A unit of measurement Xerox applies to rigid disk storage and files; a page equals 512 bytes.

parameter

Any definable characteristic of the system.

parity

A process to check the accuracy of data transmission. The process verifies the transmitted and received data by comparing the bit totals. Parity can be odd, even, or none.

parity bit

A bit used to check the accuracy of data transmission; a parity bit is added to a group of bits to make the total always odd or always even.

parity checking

The addition of non-information bits to transmitted data to make the numbers of bits either even or odd; verifies that a character has been transmitted correctly.

partitioning

Dividing a rigid disk's space into three storage areas: two for system software and one for services software.

partner See communication partner.

password The unique character string users must enter to successfully

complete logon. To protect network security, asterisks appear

instead of actual characters.

path The syntax for identifying a specific file or directory in a

hierarchical file structure.

path control The functional layer within SNA that controls the routing of

messages.

pathname The route to objects that are nested within other objects. The

format for a pathname is:

(fileservice:domain:organization)filedrawer/filefolder/filename

pattern The use of wildcards in place of some or all of the characters in a

filename, or in place of one or more parts of a fully qualified

name; used to list or display objects of a particular type.

PC File Service Software that lets PC users access files on a network File Service.

PCFS directories A collection of files maintained by the PC File Service and stored

on a File Service.

pending queue A temporary holding place for mail messages waiting to be

forwarded.

permanent virtual circuit (PVC) A circuit supported by X.25 networks which are set up

during network subscription and do not require call establishment before use. PVCs are used for applications that would normally

use leased lines on non-X.25 networks.

photoreceptor A device that transfers information in the form of an image.

physical unit (PU) A device within SNA that provides network administrative

services for its node. There are five PU types; each type is associated with a different class of devices:

• PU Type 1 - dumb terminals

• PU Type 2 - cluster controllers

PU Type 2.1 – advanced cluster controllers

PU Type 4 - communications controllers

• PU Type 5 - hosts

physical volume A formatted, permanent storage space available on rigid disk

drives.

physical volume bad page table A list of damaged or marginally usable disk pages on the physical

volume.

pica A unit of measurement equal to 0.166 inch or 12 points.

Pilot Operating System(Pilot OS) The basic operating system included with the Services System Software. Pilot OS manages server memory, files, and

network communication.

pitch

A unit of measure applied to fonts; identifies horizontal character spacing by defining the number of characters per inch. A 10 pitch font contains 10 characters per inch. Fixed pitch means that all of the similarly-sized characters in that font have the same width.

pixel

A picture element; a small discrete element, a group of which constitutes an image. The 8040 Series printer and the NS 8000 Laser CP print 300 pixels per inch. The Telecopier 495-1 prints 200 pixels per inch.

point

A unit of type measurement equal to 0.139 inch; used to describe the height or size of a set of characters within a font. There are 12 points in a pica and 72 points in an inch.

poll

To check the availability of a monitored server. Also to check a queue for messages waiting to be sent.

port

A data passage into and out of a computer or other device. Computers transmit and receive data through ports. Other devices, such as printers, receive data through ports. RS232C is a commonly used standard for computer ports.

port entry

Describes the RS232C port to the ECS. The port entry along with the host entry define the default host that is activated when the ECS starts.

primary drive

The virtual and physical components of the drive from which the server normally loads the Services System Software and other service software.

primary volume

The services volume on drive one from which the server boots the Services System Software and loads the services. Also one of two types of filing volumes used by the File Service.

Print Service

(PS) Software that provides the resource for obtaining printed output of documents to clients accessing the network; options include electronic and facsimile printers that can produce text integrated with graphics, equations, and multiple fonts.

printer

The device that transfers the image, produced by executing the Interpress master, to the medium. Also referred to as a *print device* or *engine*.

printing option

Determines how the printed documents are produced by the Print Service. Each instance of the PS is configured to provide one printing option. Printing options are the 8040 Series Electronic Printer, the Laser CP Electronic Printer, the Telecopier 495–1, and the Formatting Print Service.

processor ID

A number contained within ROM (read-only memory) in the Ethernet interface card; essential to the network addressing scheme.

profile file

The record of configuration information. See server profile.

propagation

The method by which common information travels throughout the Clearinghouse databases to maintain consistency; occurs each time an object is updated and each time a new Clearinghouse Service is added to the network.

protocol

A formal set of rules that govern the format of data and control the exchange of information between communicating devices.

protocol conversion

A function that allows two or more incompatible devices to communicate. The ECS 3270 BSC, 3270 SNA, and Asynchronous Communication options use a form of protocol conversion called device presentation emulation or datastream conversion.

public data network

A privately-owned or government-owned subscription service that provides network interconnection to the public. See **packet** switched data network.

Q

queue

A temporary holding place for documents waiting to be printed.

queuing

The process of storing and tracking documents processed by the Print Service. Also referred to as *spooling*.

R

random access memory

(RAM) Refers to the type of memory that is available to perform service functions; contents stored in RAM can be altered.

read buffer

A temporary storage place containing a list of the most recently

read data.

read errors

Errors occurring during the reading of a magnetic media.

read-only memory

(ROM) Refers to the type of memory that is always needed by the central processing unit; contents stored in ROM cannot be altered.

real memory

Volatile or changeable memory as opposed to permanent, on-disk memory. Servers must have a minimum of 512 Kb of real memory.

reboot

To restart the server or workstation. This process clears memory and reloads software.

receive buffer

A temporary storage place containing a list of the most recently received data.

record

A collection of fields in the Clearinghouse database describing a specific network object, its attributes, and values.

Records file

One of the three files of a Librarian Service database; contains the libjects.

registered object

See object.

registered user

A person who has been added as a user within a specific domain. The user object in the Clearinghouse database has the following attributes: password, aliases, home File Service name, and Mail Service name.

registration

Service initialization that creates a Clearinghouse entry and validates the entry each time the service restarts.

registration validation

The operation performed by the server registration facility when restarting a registered service. The facility verifies that the service has a valid Clearinghouse record and that the parameters in the record match those in the server profile.

remote

Not a part of the local hardware or software. Also refers to other devices or networks accessed by a communication link.

Remote Batch Service

(RBS) Software that provides document exchange with devices and systems implementing the IBM 3270 Binary Synchronous Communications (BSC) protocols. 2770, 2780, and 3780 remote batch terminals use this protocol; other data and word processing devices emulate it. The RBS uses the File Service to store documents to be transmitted to, and received from, the remote devices.

remote connection

An association created within a remote session between a remote client and a single resource on a PC File Service.

remote log file

A copy of the local log file stored in a File Service by auto-logging.

remote session

A single communication link between a remote user and the PC File Service.

Remote System Administration

(RSA) A feature of the server software that enables multiple concurrent Services Executive sessions. Available from networked workstations and remote dial-in devices to perform most administrative network tasks.

remote workstation

A workstation attached to an internetwork using an RS232C port, a modem, and leased or manually dialed lines.

removable disk

See disk pack.

removable disk drive

A type of drive that can be used in the server and that supports one removable disk pack at a time. Each server can support up to four of these drives at one time.

repeater

A device that retransmits packets from one segment to another; used when long lengths of cable are required to boost the signal on the network.

replication

Refers to the duplication of a domain, or a domain and an organization, from one Clearinghouse database to another; occurs each time a change or update occurs. Replication provides the means for domain and organization backup when multiple Clearinghouses exist in an internetwork.

resolution

The dots per inch (DPI) that a printer is capable of producing when rendering an image. The resolution is 300 DPI for the 8040 Series Electronic Printer and the NS 8000 Laser CP Electronic

Printer. The resolution is 200 DPI for the Telecopier 495–1. The quality of the printed image increases with the number of DPI. Dots per inch are also referred to as spots per inch (SPI).

resource An individual file subtree or printer offered to the network.

restart The act of causing initialization to occur.

restore To recover information from a remote backup location.

retensioning An online cartridge tape utility that sets the tape to the proper operating tension; often used to correct read errors.

rigid disk A hard disk medium used as the main storage device for software and data on the workstations and servers.

rigid disk drive with removable media

routing table

RS232C Communications Kit

RS232C

RS366

A hard disk, physically separate from the main computer, that uses removable disk packs.

rigid disk drive, Winchester A rigid disk that is normally contained within the main computer unit. Also referred to as a fixed disk.

The first directory in the filing hierarchy. On servers, the root has file drawers as its immediate descendants. On a server, there are up to four filing volumes, each with its own root.

route The path that a packet travels between the originating computer or network and the ultimate destination.

The map of the internetwork the Internetwork Routing Service maintains. The table lists each destination network and provides the route using a step or hop count.

Describes the interface between a modem and its associated data terminal equipment. Based on the Electronic Institute of America (EIA) specification of a standard electrical interface for the serial transmission of digital data.

The option that adds one external RS232C port to the server; supports byte-synchronous communications.

RS232C option (CIU) See Communications Interface Unit.

RS232C option (MPOK) See Multiport Option Kit.

The standard for achieving autodialing over a serial port; included on the local port and on the Multiport Option Kit.

S

The frequency at which the SMS instructs the monitoring server to check the availability of the monitored server.

sans serif font A font in which the characters do not have short lines stemming from each letter; Modern is a sans serf font.

scan conversion

Refers to the complete digitization of an image. A scan-converted image consists entirely of binary ones and zeros, with each digit representing a pixel.

scan direction

The description, in relationship to the medium, of the way the spots which make up the image are transferred to the medium. The fast scan direction is the orientation of the scan lines which are fed directly to the electromechanical imaging system. The slow scan direction is the direction that the fast scan lines move across the medium.

scavenging

The process of repairing the filing system after a system failure; determines the location and cause of the problem.

SDLC

See synchronous data link control.

secondary drive

A disk drive other than the primary drive that contains secondary or auxiliary volumes.

secondary volume

The Services volumes on drives 2 through 4 on the server. They are optional and used only as File Service volumes.

segment

A length of coaxial cable.

self access

An access right that lets users add themselves to, or remove themselves from, user groups.

self-registration

A function performed as part of initialization and each restart during which a service registers itself and any other resources it may control in the Clearinghouse database.

serial CRT

The teletype operator terminal directly connected to the 8000/8090 series computer when it is used as a server.

serif font

A font in which the characters have short lines stemming from each letter; Classic is a serif font.

server

A processor dedicated to running the Services System Software and one or more server applications (called services).

server access controls

Restrictions applied to Services System Software commands and other service commands based on a user's status. Users given System Administrator privileges can access all commands including those that can impact the current configuration or the state of the server or its services. Other users are given access to subsets of these commands.

server application

Same as service.

Server Monitor Service

(SMS) Software designed to monitor a group of servers from one location, check their availability and performance, and report problems by sending mail messages to the System Administrator or other designated users. The SMS requires a File Service to back up its database.

server profile

A file that stores information describing the server and its resident services.

service

Software running on a server that performs a specific function, such as printing, filing, or managing a shared network resource.

XNS provides three types of services: basic, communication, and utilities.

Services Executive

The software that lets users install, setup, maintain, and troubleshoot the server and services. A user can access it from a remote workstation or directly at the attached server console.

services options control

A password that acts as a control mechanism to let the system software determine the service options you purchased.

Services System Software

Software that runs the server and provides an environment in which one or more network services can operate and communicate with each other.

services volume

The largest of the three logical volumes on a rigid disk into which a physical volume is partitioned. This volume is the total amount of space allocated to the file system. When this volume is the primary services volume on a server, it contains all of the services code and database files. A services volume is the primary volume if it is the only rigid disk on a server, or if it is the disk from which a multi-drive server normally loads software. It is also called the filing volume or user volume.

session

An extended connection between a network user and a service during which several tasks are performed.

setup

Performing procedures to configure services for the first time.

Shared Books

A feature of the Viewpoint software that lets users share data.

Shared Interface Unit

(SIU) A device which lets one or two remote workstations access the internetwork through its RS232C ports. The SIU itself is directly attached to an Ethernet. The SIU ports use synchronous point-to-point protocol. Each SIU has two RS232C ports and is not expandable. Workstations can attach directly to the SIU's ports or can use dial-up or leased line modems. The 860 Information Processing System, and the 820-II and 16/8 Personal Computers, can be attached to an SIU.

shortname

A one to eight character ASCIIZ string used as an alias for a PC File Service resource. If defined, the alias is used as the network name.

simplex

Describes a circuit capable of one-way transmission only.

single-drive server

A server with only one volume, the primary volume.

single-net

Refers to a network configuration that contains only one Ethernet network.

site

A building or campus which has one or more networks.

slow page printing

A Print Service feature that allows more time to process a page with complex graphics and corrects image gaps before printing the page.

SMR

An abbreviation for SNA Mail Relay.

SMR database

Describes the SNA Mail Relay storage which is maintained by the SNA Access to protect mail in the event of a hardware or software failure.

SNA

See systems network architecture.

SNA Access

(SNA) Software installed with the SNA Mail Relay (SMR) that supports the SMR and other SNA applications by performing low-level protocol conversions and transmission. SNA Access provides a set of commands available in its own Services Executive context (SNA).

SNA Access application

A service, such as the SNA Mail Relay, that uses the communications and other resources of SNA Access.

SNA Mail Relay

(SMR) Software that provides mail exchange between XNS and DISOSS. For XNS-to-IBM mail, the SNA Mail Relay relies on the External Mail Gateway and Foreign Gateway Assistant. For IBM-to-XNS mail, the SMR posts mail received from DISOSS just like a workstation user does.

SNA network

A network in which the computers exchange data using SNA protocols.

SNADS

An abbreviation for SNA Distribution Services.

SNADS component

The part of the SNA Access that implements the SNADS protocols. On the XNS network, the SNADS component supports the SNA Mail Relay, an SNA Access application.

SNADS network

An SNA network in which the computers are running software that implements the SNA Distribution Services (SNADS) protocols for document distribution.

SNADS network name

In the SNA Mail Relay context, the name of the SNADS network with which an XNS network exchanges mail.

snapshot

The set of increments produced during a given backup cycle.

soft read errors

Errors reading a magnetic media that are correctable.

Software Control Center

The Xerox office that provides passwords and software serial numbers.

software serial numbers

(SSN) The numbers identifying product options to be enabled during server configuration.

source drive

The rigid disk drive containing the filing volume that sends information to the destination drive during a File Service copy volume backup.

source drive

The rigid disk drive containing the filing volume that sends information to the destination drive during a File Service copy volume backup.

split increment

A backup increment that is created in parts. Each split increment contains a list, called a split increment index, of all files considered for backup.

split increment index

A list of the files that existed on the volume when backup was

spooling

The process storing and tracking documents processed by the Print Service. Also referred to as *queuing*.

SSN

An abbreviation for software serial number.

Standard Etherboot Files

The Boot Service files containing the network diagnostics and installation utilities.

Standard Services Software

The software package containing the basic server operating system and the Services System Software, the Clearinghouse Service, the External Communication Service, the Server Monitor Service, and Online diagnostics.

started

The service state which determines the available resources. The available commands depend on the existing configuration information and the user's status.

station

Refers to a computer, workstation, or server.

status distribution

A Distribution Interface Unit (DIU) that SNADS applications use to display error messages and to confirm delivery.

step count

A measurement used by the Internetwork Routing Service to determine the number of Internetwork Routing Services a packet will encounter during transmission from one network to another; also known as a hop count.

stop bit(s)

One or two bits at the end of a character in asynchronous transmissions; used to signal the beginning of the next character.

stopped

The service state in which only the **Start Service** command is available.

storage device

A medium (floppy disk, cartridge tape, disk pack or disk drive) used to store data and programs.

store frequency

The parameter in the Communication Monitoring Service monitoring profile that identifies the number of times to store log files to a File Service during auto-logging.

subdirectory

A file folder containing other folders and documents.

summary error log

A list of errors found on the floppy disk drive hardware through various diagnostic tests.

summary log

A list of RS232C hardware errors.

switched line

A dial-up phone connection; not leased. This connection allows the sharing of resources and switching from one resource to another.

switched virtual circuit

(**SVC**) A circuit supported by X.25 networks that gives the illusion of providing a point-to-point connection to the X.25 network. SVCs are set up at call establishment time and are used for applications that would normally use dial-up and dial-out lines on non-X.25 networks.

synchronous

Transmission of data in which the time interval between successive bits is constant. Differs from the asynchronous protocols in which the receiver and sender synchronize on the start and stop bits associated with each character.

synchronous data link control

(**SDLC**) A bit-oriented protocol for data transfer between devices using synchronous data transmission techniques; defines the data link control layer associated with SNA.

synchronous message

A message the server displays in response to a user action.

synchronous modem

A modem that generates pulses to synchronize with the modem at the other end of the phone line. Differs from an asynchronous modem, which transmits start and stop bits for synchronization.

SYSGEN

The configuration or system generation of a processor in the IBM environment, which allows communication with connected computers, controllers, and terminals.

System Administrator

A user with specific responsibilities for setting up and maintaining the network services. In each domain of an internetwork, there is at least one System Administrator.

Systems Analyst

A Xerox employee available to assist System Administrator with network tasks.

system volume

One of the three logical volumes created by partitioning the hard disk. On the primary drive, it is used to store database and files; it can also be used for shared filing. On a secondary drive, it may be used for shared filing and backup procedures.

systems network architecture

(SNA) Describes the logical structure, formats, and protocols used by data communication networks. Developed by IBM for distributed processing networks.

T

tap block The device that makes the physical connection between the

transceiver and the coaxial cable.

Target Print Service The printer to which a Formatting Print Service sends documents.

A unit of work to be performed by the Remote Batch Service; also called a job.

task folder A folder used by the Remote Batch Service to transport tasks.

teletype protocols

The communication standards used by remote terminals and the Interactive Terminal Service to allow information exchange on the

network.

task

terminal An input and output device, consisting of a keyboard and video display, that is attached to a server. Also refers to a device being

emulated by ViewPoint.

terminal emulation (3278, VT100, TTY)

Options that let the 6085, 8010, 860, and IBM PC workstations act like (emulate) terminals that are able to communicate with

mainframe or minicomputer hosts. See 3278 Terminal Emulation software.

terminals (2770, 2780, 3780)

The family of IBM Remote Batch Terminals with which the Remote Batch Service communicates.

terminator

A cap placed on each end of a coaxial cable segment to terminate a signal.

test bad pages

A diagnostic for the 8000 server medium capacity disk that attempts to repair bad pages and records their numbers in the bad page table.

test patterns

Interpress masters stored on the Print Service which are used to identify problems with print quality. Some print engines with noticeable tolerances in their paper path need an alignment pattern to aid in the adjustment of digital timing to coincide with the paper path.

3270 Communications Protocol

A software option that supports compatible information exchange between workstations emulating 3270 terminals and an IBM host; used with the External Communication Service (ECS); supports both IBM 3270 Binary Synchronous Communication (BSC) and IBM 3270 System Network Architecture (SNA) protocols.

3270 SDLC/SNA Communication Protocol option

Optional software that enables users to communicate interactively with hosts in the SNA environment using SDLC protocol.

3270 series terminals

Refers to a series of IBM display terminals that access mainframe application using cluster controllers. ViewPoint terminal emulation software emulates 3278-2, 3278-3, 3278-4, and 3278-5 series terminals.

3278 Terminal Emulation software

Optional software that enables workstations to emulate a 3278-2, 3278-3, 3278-4, or 3278-5 display terminal.

throughput

Relates to the speed with which data transmission or other operations are performed; describes the total information communicated during a specific period of time.

time stamp

The date and time a document or activity log was created or when an event occurred.

top-level directory

A directory that is a descendant of the volume root.

topology

The physical layout of a network.

trace table

A list of the most recently entered commands.

transceiver

The device between the networked computer interface card and the Ethernet cable. A transceiver sends signals to and receives signals from devices on the network. Also detects collisions on a channel or clear channel status. Each networked device has its own transceiver.

transient link

A link between Clearinghouses that does not remain constant.

transmission

The sending of data to one or more locations or recipients.

transmit buffer

A temporary storage place containing a list of the most recently transmitted data.

transparent transmission

A mode of transmission in BSC protocol where the data is permitted to have any value; used to transmit non-textual information.

TTY

An abbreviation for teletypewriter; refers to equipment with typewriter-like keyboards used in communication systems.

turnaround tool loopback test

A diagnostic test that checks the RS232C asynchronous functions.

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uninterpreted

A file transfer mode the Remote Batch Service uses for interchanging documents without altering their content.

update propagation

An automatic activity the Clearinghouse Service performs when it receives an update to its database. See propagation.

user

A person who interacts with the software through a user interface at the server or the workstation.

user group

An object in a domain that contains a list of users; used instead of entering all user names when assigning access rights or sending messages to all members.

user interface

The interaction between a user and a server or workstation, including the messages and prompts that appear on the screen.

user name

The fully qualified name or the alias of a user registered in the Clearinghouse Service database.

user profile

A file maintained by the Interactive Terminal Service listing information such as the directory path, terminal options, and Print Service data in effect for each user when they logged off.

User Profiles drawer

A file drawer containing Interactive Terminal Service user profile information.

user volume

See services volume.

utilities services

The services that monitor server performance and communication activity; provide etherbooting of installation and diagnostic utility programs; and control access to a database of shared data. These services include: the Boot Service, the Communications Monitoring Service, the Librarian Service, and the Server Monitor Service.

utility

A kind of file which performs a single dedicated function, such as installing software or diagnosing hardware problems.

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value The information associated with an attribute.

verify disk surface An offline diagnostic test for the 8000 server large capacity drive or the 8090 server high capacity disk drive that identifies the bad

pages on the disk.

verify read operation An online cartridge tape utility that determines whether a

problem is caused by the tape media or the drive hardware.

verify tape surface An offline diagnostic test for the 8090 server cartridge tape drive

that identifies the bad pages on the tape surface.

virtual circuit See permanent virtual circuit.

virtual memory A technique that provides the illusion that main memory is

unlimited; created by combining small memory with a large disk thus treating secondary storage as an extension of main memory.

voice-grade A circuit or line capable of speech transmission.

volume A logically distinct collection of files which can be made

accessible or inaccessible at the same time. A disk pack contains one volume and each volume contains one file system. Volume

names are registered in the Clearinghouse as a File Service.

volume root A single directory which forms the base of a hierarchical file

structure. The volume root is an ancestor of every file on the volume, and every file on the volume is a descendant of the

volume root.

volume state Refers to the various states of a server volume, which include:

open, closed, online, and offline.

VT100 A type of serial CRT used with timesharing systems; can be

emulated by ViewPoint so users can connect to remote hosts

through the External Communication Service.

W

WAK Wait acknowledgment; a signal sent during data transmission;

usually means data was received and transfer cannot begin until

the service responds.

wide area network (WAN) A network comprised of several interconnected network

sites.

wildcard A symbol that stands for one or more characters in a filename or

in place of one or more parts of a fully qualified name; used to specify many objects of a particular type. A wildcard symbol may

be an asterisk (*) or a chart sign (#).

A single-user computer designed for word processing use; also word processor

refers to word processing software that runs on a general

purpose computer.

The directory in the file system of the server where files can be working directory

stored for access by the System Administrator.

An array of log entries in virtual memory which contain data working log file

captured from the communication line being monitored by the

CMS. There are two working log files.

A computer that directly or remotely connects to the network to workstation

access network services.

write buffer A temporary storage place containing a list of the most recently

written data.

To allow the read/write heads access to the storage device so write enable

that new information can be added and existing information to

be changed.

Errors occurring when data is recorded on a magnetic media. write errors

To prevent write access to the storage device; existing write protect

information may be viewed but not altered in any way.

X

Xerox Character Code

The 16-bit character code used by Xerox that is fully compatible

with the 8-bit ASCII code set and the ISO 646 standard.

Xerox Network System

(XNS) A combination of hardware and software that unites specialized devices into a network where the capabilities of a

variety of workstations are enhanced by distributed services.

XID

Stands for Exchange ID, which is a hexadecimal number that

identifies the SNA Access to the host over the phone line.

XModem protocol

An asynchronous communication protocol that facilitates file transfer between personal and mainframe computers. XModem protocol requires eight data bits, no parity, and one

stop bit.

XOn/XOff

A flow control method used in asynchronous communication in which a receiving device sends an XOff character when it cannot

receive any more data and sends on XOn character when it is

able to receive more data.

X.25 Communications Protocol

An Internetwork Routing Service option that defines an interface between data terminal equipment (DTE) and data circuit terminating equipment (DCE) for terminals operating in the packet mode on public data networks. X.25 is structured to allow

multiplexing, which lets many virtual circuits share a single

physical link.
