Extensions

1. Newsletter Summary

- Some brief details are provided of the new IBM 3083 system to be installed in March.
- Changes to contract work rates apply from 1 January 1984.
- A new version is available of a DEC10 program (CNVOBJ) for converting between different formats of files commonly used in microprocessor systems
- VAX/VMS users and RSX-11/M users may have some problems when conducting a terminal session on another system in the network. If you have had an error code "hardware option not present" or 'option not present' then see the section "Set Host between VAX/VMS and RSX-11/M Systems".
- An error in the CSIRONET file transfer software has been corrected.
- The RXT task which provides an improved method of virtual terminal access from RSX-11/M systems to DEC10 is available. The current method of virtual terminal access will not be available after 31 March.
- Decnet users now have a network file transfer spooler. As well as a new network file transfer task (NFT to replace NETACC) which is quicker and cheaper.
- The Collection District Summary information for Queensland from the 1976 and 1981 Census of Population on Housing is now available for access via the data base system on the KL10 computer.
- Those who use acoustic couplers should note the new number 377 2977 (or extension 2977 for free internal calls).
- Information is provided on courses.

2. New Central Computer

Specifications were issued in May 1983 for additional central computing equipment to replace the 15 year old KA10 system and meet growth in demand for central computing services for the University of Queensland and Griffith University. Seven tenders were received and, following detailed evaluation, the Computing Committees of the University of Queensland and Griffith University reached a unanimous decision to recommend acceptance of the IBM tender. This was approved by both Universities and a contract was executed with IBM on 24 November 1983.

The equipment is to be delivered in March 1984. It comprises an IBM 3083E system with 16 million bytes of memory, four IBM 3380 disk storage units each with a capacity 2500 million bytes, two IBM 3420 High Speed Magnetic Tape Units (320K bytesec and 6250 bpi), a 3203 Line Printer (1000 lpm) and five IBM Series 1 Communications Processors.

Following acceptance test and the necessary work by the Centre to bring the system into operation, it is planned that the system be available to users on a restricted basis for trial and practice at no charge. Formal operations are planned to commence by Second Semester. The Computing Policy Committee has appointed a Committee (Convenor — Dr. R. Girle, Philosophy) to consider the basis of charging.

Further details will be provided on languages data base systems, operational aspects and special training courses etc. in the next issue of the newsletter.

3. Charging rates for Contract Programming

As from 1.1.1984 the overhead charge for contract programming and systems work for jobs involving more than 25 hours of work was increased from 15 per cent to 20 per cent additional to the actual costs of staff employed on a job.

In as far as smaller jobs are concerned the hourly rate for contract programming and systems work for jobs involving 25 hours or less of work was increased from \$20 per hour to \$30 per hour, with the minimum charge to be \$30 for any one job.

These increases are unfortunately unavoidable and are designed to bring contract programming rates closer to the actual costs incurred.

4. New Version of CNVOBJ

CNVOBJ is a DEC10 program for converting between different formats of object files commonly used in microprocessor systems.

A new version of CNVOBJ was recently moved to MXI:. The main new features are the /OFFSET switch for specifying a relocation constant to be added to all load addresses in the input file and the /ODD and /EVEN switches for specifying that the output file is to contain data from the input file which would have been loaded at ODD or EVEN addresses. This last pair of switches is particularly useful for preparing Read Only Memories for use in the BDV-11 (and similar) bootstrap boards for the Q-BUS PDP-11 family. Such boards require a rom for the ODD byte of a word and a separate ROM to store bytes with EVEN address.

5. "SET HOST" between VAX/VMS and RSX-11/M Systems

DECNET under VAX/VMS and RSX-11/M includes utilities which allow users to conduct a terminal session on another system. Under VAX/VMS the "SET HOST" command is used to begin a session on another system which may be a VAX/VMS system or an RSX-11/M system. Under RSX-11/M the command RMT is used to begin a session on a remote RSX-11/M system and the command RVT is used to begin a session on a remote VAX/VMS system.

In all cases though, the remote system cannot make use of terminal facilities that are not present in the system to which the system is physically connected. Mostly this doesn't cause any problems but just recently a case did arise in which a VAX/VMS user SET HOST to an RSX-11/M system and invoked an RSX task (namely QEDIT) which attempted to ATTACH the console with unsolicited-input character AST. VAX/VMS does not provide the ability to ATTACH the console with unsolicited-input character AST so the operation failed with RSX returning to the task the error code "hardware option not present".

Users who use the network to conduct sessions on remote VAX/VMS or RSX-11/M systems should be aware this may happen and not be perturbed by it. Note that not all RSX-11/M systems are generated with the same features in the terminal driver, and attempts to use a feature which the driver doesn't support is also likely to cause an error code of "option not present" to be returned to the requesting task.

6. CSIRONET File Transfers

A bug in the CSIRONET file transfer software which caused a file transferred to CSIRONET to have 1 to 4 erroneous characters ("") appended has been fixed.

7. Removal of Virtual Terminal to DEC10 from RSX-11M Systems

The current method of virtual terminal access to the DEC10 from RSX-11M systems running DECNET-11M will not be supported after 31 March 1984. The current method relies on a facility of the DECNET gateways which is being removed because it is expensive in CPU time and uses memory which could be used for buffers to improve the performance of the DECNET gateways.

An alternate method of virtual terminal access to the DEC10 will be made available. The new method is a considerable improvement over the previously available method in that status is now passed between the DEC10 and the RXT task so that terminal echo can be controlled by DEC10 (login passwords will now not echo) and the terminal can be switched in and out of single character mode.

8. File Transfer Spooler for RSX-11M

Users of RSX-11M systems which run DECNET-11M may wish to make use of the network file transfer spooler (FTS). FTS works in a similar fashion to NFT (the Network File Transfer task) except that the transfers are not performed immediately but rather requests are placed on a queue and subsequently processed by a spooler.

Some differences between network file transfers done using NFT and transfers done using FTS:

- 1. NFT transfers begin immediately, but FTS transfers begin an indefinite time after the request is made. An FTS switch allows users to request the transfer to not begin until AFTER a specified time.
- 2. If a remote node is not on-line NFT cannot perform the transfer, but FTS will wait until the remote node comes on-line.

3. NFT reports the status of the transfer to the user's terminal (TI:) but FTS can be directed to log the result of each transfer request to a file.

9. Network File Transfer Program for DEC-10

A new program NFT for performing network file transfers between the DEC10 and DECNET nodes (such as RSX-11 systems and VAX/VMS systems) has recently been put on NEW:. NFT has a number of advantages over the older program NETACC.

- 1. NFT is quicker and cheaper than NETACC especially for transfers to the DEC10 and transfers to a VAX. For example, a transfer of a 415 block file from the DEC10 to node UQVAX cost \$3.58 and took 3 mins 58 secs elapsed time using NETACC and cost \$0.99 and took 1 min 57 sec elapsed time using NFT.
- 2. NFT takes notice of the type of the remote system and optimises the transfer. NFT will normally write files to a non-FCS-11 (i.e. non RSX-11M) system in "stream" mode for lowest cost and fastest transfer. However RSX-11/M systems normally cannot process "stream" mode files so NFT sends files to RSX-11/M systems in "variable length record" mode which takes more time because NFT must take notice of the file record (or line) boundaries.

Note that files transfered to VAX/VMS systems for use under the RSX-/M emulator must be written in "variable length record" mode otherwise the RSX-11/M utilities will not be able to process the files. The switch /TRANSFER:NOSTREAM may be used to force NFT to transfer a file in "variable length record" mode.

- 3. NFT is able to transfer files to the DEC10 in an 8 bit-byte mode suitable for direct queuing to the phototypesetter. Such files must be written on the DECNET system with attributes "fixed length records". The switch /TRANSFER:ASCII may be used to force NFT to write a file transferred to the DEC10 as a file of 7-bit bytes, i.e. a normal text file.
- 4. NFT includes a mode in which the DEC10 may be used as a file archive for DECNET nodes. If the /TRANSFER:BLOCK switch is used then files are written to the DEC10 as 8-bit bytes and the file attributes of file-organisation, record attributes, record format and maximum record size are encoded into the DEC10 file version word along with a flag to indicate this has been done. When a file is transferred to a DECNET system its DEC10 version number is examined and if it appears to be an encoded set of file attributes these attributes are set on the file written on the DECNET system.
- 5. NFT supports wild-cards on both the DEC10 and DECNET systems.

Further details can be found in the NFT HELP file which may be typed by giving the command

HELP NFT

to the monitor or the /HELP switch to the NFT program.
